### ED CREGER, PROMINENT AS CRICKETER, IS DEAD

He Was Star Player With Philadelphia Cricket Club

Edward M. Cregar, one of Philadelphia's best-known cricketers, died this morning at his residence, 7201 Boyer street, Chestnut Hill. He was born in Philadelphia on December 28, 1869, and at an early age he became interested in cricket. He first played for the old Tioga team, of which J. B. King also was a member, and later joined the Belmont Cricket Club, of which he was a member for many years. At the time of his death Mr. Cregar was a member of the Philadelphia Cricket Club. Mr. Cregar was a first-class mediumpace bowler, and a fine hard-hitting Batsman.
