Inmate of Home Killed by Arsenic—Proprietor Blamed. More Cases Sought

HARTFORD, Conn., May 8.—Mrs. Mary E. Archer Gilligan, proprietor of the Archer House at Windsor, a pay home for elderly persons, was arrested by the State police last night, charged with the murder of one of the inmates. According to the State police, who have been conducting a secret investigation into the workings of the institution for a year, it is their belief that out of 48 deaths there within the last five years, no fewer than 20 were caused by violence or poison.
