**ALLEGHENY'S VOTE
ON DELEGATE CLOSE**

Penrose Leads Governor Brumbaugh by Only 2000 in the County

PITTSBURGH, May 18.—A clear majority for the 12 Penrose unpledged delegates-at-large, indicated early yesterday when the city returns in Allegheny county were counted. In the 12 towns and 11 townships came in they elected one unpledged candidate from the race. George R. Scull, of Somersett, and endorsed two others, Alba B. Johnson and James Elverson, Jr., of Philadelphia. State Senator W. J. Burke of Allegheny, has crowded out Scull.

Governor Brumbaugh, gaining fast all day, occupies 13th place among the delegates-at-large candidates, separated from Johnson, in 12th place, by 58 votes, this with 71 districts out of 791 in the county missing.

Auditor General Powell, occupying 14th place, has been coming strong all day. The missing 71 districts, all country, are nearly certain to give Brumbaugh Powell more than 1000.

"Impetus was given to the national volunteer movement by fear that conscription would be applied," said Penrose, "it brought numerous men into the Sinn Fein movement. This number at the beginning of the disturbance was estimated at 15,200, including 1200 in the provinces outside of Dublin. This Dublin corps numbered about 2000."

"A paid organizer was sent into the provinces. The police estimated before the outbreak of the insurrection that the volunteers had 1886 rifles, pistols and pop guns, \$25 rifles in Dublin alone."

"Associations of the leaders with a foreign agent were sufficient to justify the arrest of the chief conspirators, which was decided upon. On April 24, while matters were being discussed at Dublin castle, pistol shots rang out. The Royal Irish constabulary was considered strong enough to cope with disorders. A mobile force of 2000 men, 500 mounted and three machine guns, was always ready. Those, with 200 men from Carragh, were thought capable of dealing with the outbreak in Dublin, but, contrary to expectations they were insufficient."

**FEDERAL TRADE COMMISSION
MEMBER ASSAILED IN SENATE**

W. J. Harris Charged With Mixing in Politics by Senator Newlands

WASHINGTON, May 18.—Senator Newlands of Nevada, vigorously assailed W. J. Harris, Democratic member of the Federal Trade Commission, on the Senate floor today for taking an active part in the Georgia Democratic State Convention.

Newlands said the Federal Trade Commission was intended to be nonpartisan and charged Harris with partiality in trying to influence a convention.

Sen. Hardwick, of Georgia, defended Harris, declaring he saw no impropriety in his action. This precipitated a discussion which droned in the name of Supreme Court Justice Hughes.

"I'd like to ask the Senator if he thinks it is any worse for a member of the Federal Trade Commission to go to a convention than it is for a member of the Senate or of the United States to be a candidate for President?" asked Senator Ross, of Missouri.

"I'd like to ask what the Senator thinks of a member of the Federal Trade Commission who tries to influence legislation in the Senate," Senator Gallingher, Republican leader, said.

The debate then ended suddenly by a call for the regular order of business.



**WILSON ASKS WESCOTT
TO MAKE NOMINATION**

Governor Fielder, Designated by Delegation to Make Speech, May Withdraw

WASHINGTON, May 18.—In accordance with an agreement reached at the White House last Monday between President Wilson and Attorney General Wescott, of New Jersey, President Wilson today made public a letter he has written to Governor Fielder, at Trenton, reiterating his desire that Mr. Wescott make the nominating speech at St. Louis. The President's letter follows:

My Dear Governor:

I am sorry that a tangle should have occurred with regard to the arrangements for the nominating speech at the approaching National Convention. Our desire is that the delegates will be a natural expression of their confidence and admiration, and you may be sure that I should have considered it an honor to be put in nomination by you. But the fact is that for weeks past whenever I was asked by my friends who personal choice was, invariably repeated, Judge Wescott. I can never forget the enthusiasm and generosity with which he undertook this duty four years ago, and it has always been my hope, if I should ever be nominated again, that he should undertake it. But, as you know, I have written to him expressing this preference and begging him to put me in nomination.

I am sure that you will understand and will realize that it is not a choice of Judge Wescott in preference to yourself, but a long standing choice from which my thought has never turned.

(Signed) WOODROW WILSON.

It is now expected that Governor Fielder, who was designated by the New Jersey delegates to make the speech, will favorably withdraw.
