MOVIE CENSOR BILL ATTACKED IN HOUSE

Naming of Federal Board Would Stretch Constitution to Breaking Point, Says Minority

WASHINGTON, May 22 .- A vigorous at tack on the proposed moving-picture cen-sorship bill was contained in a minority report on the measure submitted to the House today by four members of the House Education Committee. The report declares that the establishment of a Federal Board of Censors would "stretch the implied power of Congress under the Con-stitution to the breaking point."

The report was signed by Representa-tives Rucker, of Missouri; Powers, of Kenucky; Platt, of New York, and Dallinger, of Massachusetts. "The most serious objection to this bill."

the report said, "lies in the powers it seeks to give an executive commission to trammel the moving picture art, the propa-gandist and power of which is already marvelously developed and the potential power of which seems limitless."

The minority of the committee declares that the overwhelming weight of opinion among moving picture producers is against "In our opinion," the report concluded

"every reasonable protection to the pub-lic morals can be secured by the proper exercise of the local police power, sup-plemented by an amendment to the Fed-eral penal code, including moving pictures in the list of articles barred from inter state commerce for stated causes. The extraordinary power vested in the pro-posed commission will not only prove ineffective to protect public morals, but is utterly un-American in its character and in the highest degree dangerous from every oint of view."

In a statement accompanying the report Representative Dallinger declared that the bill "seeks to set up in this country prepublicity censorship, one of the most effective instruments of European military despotism, and I cannot believe that any political party is willing to assume the responsibility for its enactment."

The morning and afternoon services netted about \$5000, and the evening service brought the total up to more than \$6000, the largest amount ever given to Doctor Biederwolf in a single cam-
