ALL-INDIAN CAST PLAYS SHAKESPEARE IN OBSERVANCE OF CENTENARY

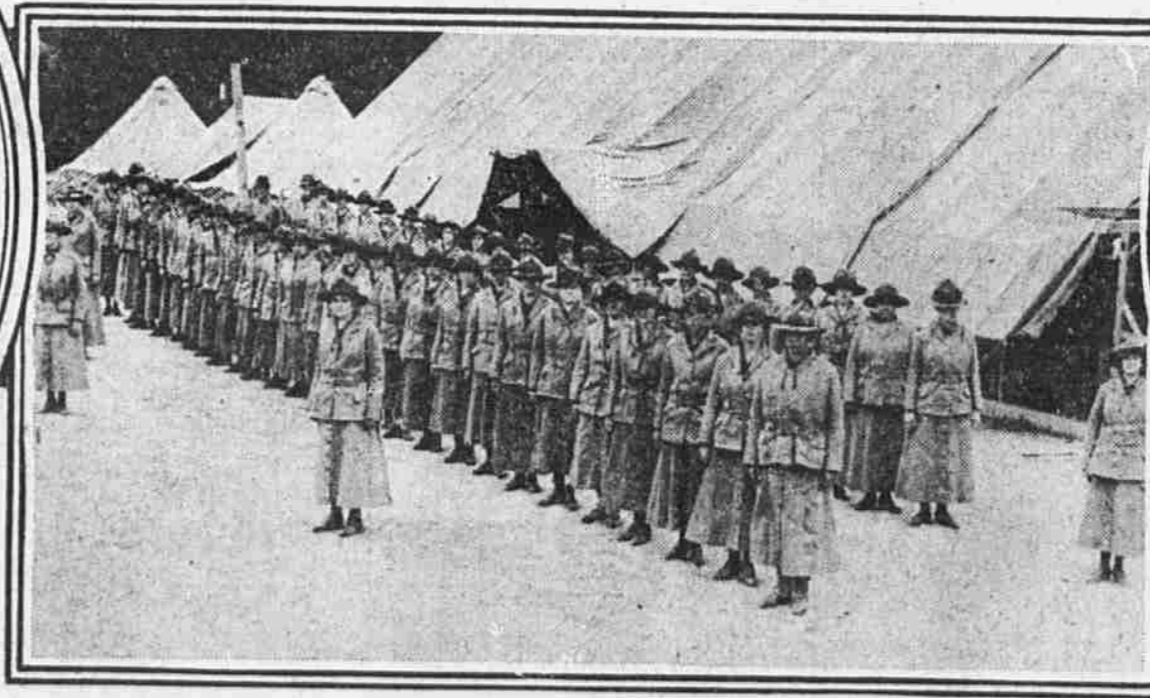
