There are 421 pupils in classes for cooking, sewing, embroidering, carpentering, singing, dancing, dramatics and music. There are 539 members of different clubs Dental clinics are held twice a week, where hundreds of persons are treated.

There is a baby clinic, a library, a say ings fund, a coal savings fund, story and play-houses for little children, moving pictures and open house dances. The Southwark Neighborhood House works in co-operation with the Bureau of Health and Charities, The Child Federation. The Civic Club of Philadelphia and Drexel, Temple and Beechwood Domestic Science Schools, which provide cooking and sewing teachers.

Last year's disbursements were \$3,281.03, and because this budget is too small to carry on such important work this Festival of Apollo has been promoted to procure the needed added fund, and bids fair to be an unqualified success.


