

NANCY WYNNE GLEANS MUCH FROM RETURNING ROOKIES

Numerous Festivities Feature Closing of Encampment at Chevy Chase—Mrs. Barnett's Garden Party One of Many Delightful Entertainments Given at Washington

WHEN Johnny came marching home never proved half so thrilling as when he came home in a khaki-clad tunic and tights, by the rigors of a real military camp, tripped blithely home today after the closing exercises of the National Service School held at Chevy Chase. The official breaking up of the camp took place early this morning, so that those "rookies" who were obliged to leave for home today would be able to make their trains. Fully sixty girls returned home to Baltimore and about one-third of that number to this city, although a few are staying on in Washington for a day or two.

Every one is still talking of Mrs. Barnett's garden party—she gave it, you know, on Monday. The girls left the camp at 4:30 o'clock and were conveyed in special cars to the home of the General and Mrs. Barnett at the Marine Barracks.

There a reception was held and every one had a perfect time, even if it did shower all afternoon. The Marine Band, under the shelter of a marquee, which had been erected for the occasion, furnished music. The soldierettes did not return to camp until 7 o'clock; then, after a rather hasty evening meal eaten in darkness, for the mess tent was not fitted with any lighting fixtures, they marched over to the assembly tent to watch the antics of numerous members of Company A, who gave a screamingly funny circus. A ring had been cleared in the middle of the tent and here the talented performers appeared. I am told that none of the familiar essentials of a first-class circus were lacking—even to the indispensable peanuts and popcorn.

There was a trained elephant, a pony, the Siamese triplets, the bearded lady, the fat lady, a Chinese magician and, best of all, a ballet girl, stunning in her abbreviated fluffy skirts. Then there was also a take-off on the different companies by a picked squad, which, led by its corporal, went through the paces—squad right, left front into line, column right and all the other phases of the drill—all the while keeping in perfect "roo-est-est."

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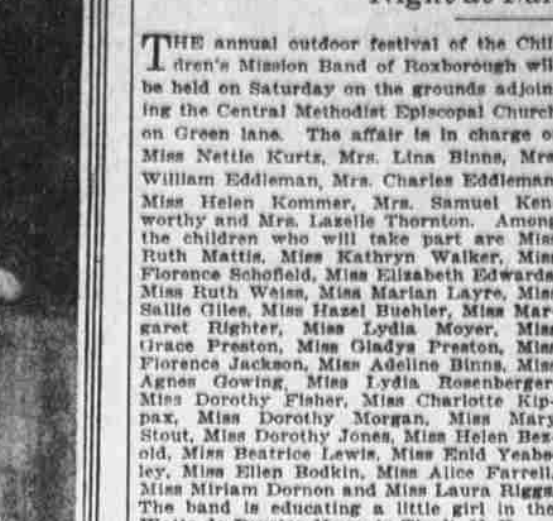
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CHILDREN'S OUTDOOR FESTIVAL WILL BE HELD IN ROXBOROUGH
