NEW YORK, May 31.—Good Liverpool cables were offset by favorable weather conditions in the South, which held the cotton market in check, and the opening prices were 3 points higher to 1 point lower, with the tone steady. Trading was light, and after the start

there was some pressure from scattered sources which forced quotations off a point or two. Wall street purchased moderately and spot houses took some July. Liverpool was a light buyer of January and sold March.
