Each day's entertainment during the Each day's entertainment during the convention will be concluded with a cabaret performance, starting at 11 p. m., and ending when everybody wants to go to bed. These cabaret performances will be by amateur talent. There will be many snappy musical and dancing features, and other things which put ginger into a cabaret show. Chicago will run the show Monday night at the Bellevue-Stratford, and from all reports the cabaret artists from that city will make folks sit up and take notice. New York will supervise Tuesday's show New York will supervise Tuesday's show at the Hotel Adelphia. The New Yorkers promise to present some brand new "stuff" right out of the Broadway amusement reservoir. Baltimore will boss the cabaret at the Ritz-Carlton on Wednesday, and on Thursday staid Boston will put on a live show at the Walton. The Boston artists say there will nothing especially Puritanical about their performance.

"At first we planned to have these events on the roof gardens, but so many folks insist on seeing them that we decided to move them downstairs, handy-like to the crowds—and likewise convenient to the taxicabs.

These cabaret performances will be open to everyone, of course, and will run with professional-like skill and 'eciat,' as the Fosten crowd puts it. 
THE WEATHER

MERGER OF COLLEGES MAKES CITY LEADING CENTRE OF MEDICINE

Change Marks the Disappearance of the Medico-Chi as a Separate and Distinct School

WILL BE POSTGRADUATE

Plans have been completed for the union of the medical school of the University of Pennsylvania, Jefferson Medical College and the Medico-Chirurgical College of Philadelphia, a merger which will make Philadelphia the largest medical centre in America.
These institutions will be under under the general name of "The Medical School of the University of Pennsylvania and the Jefferson Medical College of Philadelphia."
The change marks the disappearance of Medico-Chi from this city as a separate and distinct medical school, "Chi" will be a post-graduate school and will be an institution for research and special study. It is probable that a hospital will be erected in connection with this school.

The necessit Medico-Chi Hemital is on phia, a merger which will make Philadel

The present Medico-Chi Hospital is on the line of the Parkway and will be con-demned by the city. With the money to be derived through damages to be awarded by the municipality, the new college and hospital will be erected. The location of these buildings has not been determined. The official name of the new school will

be the "Medico-Chirurgical College Gradu-ats School of Medicine in the University of Pennsylvania." Eight members of the present Medico-Chi faculty will be teachers in the graduate institution, while five others will be identified with, "Jeff" in the future. Government of the merged college will be rested in the "United Medical Committee Provost Smith will be chairman of this body and the president of "Jeff" will be vice chairman. The dean and vice dean will be selected by the committee.

The agreement under which the union

was consummated was drafted by John G. Johnson. Public announcement of the com-pletion of plans was made last night in the Bellevue-Stratford, at the annual dinner of aiumni of Jefferson College. It was also an-neunced at the dinner that an endowment fund of \$200,000 had been raised by the alumni and that this amount would become a part of the financial resources of the united institution.

The sum of \$1400 was raised at the banquet, thus bringing the total up to the de-sired figure. Daniel Baugh, founder of the Baugh institute of Anatomy, a part of the Jefferson organization, pledged himself a year ago to subscribe \$100,000 to an endowment fund if a like sum were raised by other persons before June 16. When Wil-liam Potter, president of the Jefferson board of trustees, announced at the dinner that only \$1400 was needed to meet Mr. Baugh's proposition the necessary sum was raised immediately.
