President Sharpless, of Haverford College, Tells Graduates System Explains Powerful Verdun Resistance

GERMANS TOOK IT FIRST

Two Hundred Day Class Pupils Received Diplomas and Special Award of Merit

The effective resistance by France at Marne and Verdun has been and is due to its highly developed system of education, which Bonaparte ignored and which France adopted only after it had realized Bonaparte's mistake in permitting the Germans to put it in operation, according to Dr. Issae Sharpless, president of Haverford College, speaker today at the Drexel Institute commencement exercises, in the auditorium of the school, 32d and Chestnut streets.

streium of the school, set a streium of the school, set a streium of the great Swiss reformer of education, Pentalozzi, attempted to see Napoleon and lay his views before the French emperor," declared Dr. Sharpless, "but Napoleon said he had no time for 'A B C's.' Pestalozzi carried-his ideas to Germany, then devastated by wars, and these ideas were responsible for the overthrow of the third Bonaparte, at Sedan. France learned its mistake and we see the fruits of her present system in her resistance at Marne and at verdun."
