The formal opening of the Business Girls' Home, at 804 Pine street, took place yesterday afternoon, when the women inerested in the undertaking gave an opening tea. The home is arranged so as to accommodate about 30 girls, who earn their own living. The project is not a charitable one. It is backed by several wealthy women of this city, but the girls are to pay board and lodging and receive many comforts in return.

The building which will have the new club is a four-story structure. It contains a living room, two dining rooms, kitchen, laundry, two bathrooms and five lavatories. Each girl has a single enameled bed, oak bureau and rocker in her room. A washerwoman will be in the building every day to do the washing of clothes for the girls at a nominal price. The living room on the first floor is beautifully furnished with wicker furniture, plano, rugs and everything that spells "home." Of course, there will be rules, but those rules will be just the same as the rules that would be set down by the girls' parents. Weekly entertainments will be given for and by the girls.

After the girls get their breakfast in the mornings, there will be plates piled high with sandwiches, fruits and cake. They will be given paper and string and allowed to make up their own luncheons to carry to work with them. There will be no charge for this service. There are a number of girls installed in the house already.

There are about 30 prominent women who are on the board of managers, all of whom helped bring the club to a realization.
