WAR INEVITABLE, SAYS CARRANZA OFFICIAL, ON REJECTION OF DEMAND

MEXICO CITY, June 27.—High officials of the Maxican Government stated today that Chief Executive Carranas had decided to reject President Wilson's demand that the American prisoners captured in the bat-tis of Carrisal be released by the Chibauhau milliare authorities litary authorities.

"If the United States makes peace con-ment upon the freeing of these prisoners," ay asserted, "war is certain."

Drafting of the formal reply to the nited States ultimatum was completed at a Foreign Office shortly after midnight. From an authoritative source it was learned that the reply informs the United States that the attitude of the de facto Government toward that country has been

It is understood that First Chief Car at is understood that First Chief Car-ranza insists that the presence of American troops on Mexican soil is contrary to the wishes of the Mexican people and Govern-ment, that he reitorates previous demands for their withdrawal and that he places ansibility for hostilities if they come upon the American Government.



WAR SPIRIT SWEEPS BORDER;

TROOPS ON BOTH SIDES READY

Ane actual situation is snown by an oc-curence near Progresso, 40 miles from Brownsville, last night. Two armed Mexi-cans, who attempted to cross the Rid Grande, were fired upon by an American border patrol. One of the Mexicans was killed and another wounded. Along the Rio Grande near San Benito, Mexican soldiers have concentrated for a sudden dash into American territory. On

sudden dash into American territory. On the Arizona border, Carranzista forces are threatening the towns of Naco. Bisbee and Nogales. A special train is carrying Ameri-can troops to the Mexican-Arizona front.

The Mexican troops along the thinly guarded Arizona line far outnumber the American soldiers. This may require a shift in the plans that had been made for an invasion of Mexico in case of war. Juarez will be occupied, as has been announced before in these dispatches, but General Fershing may have to send part of his troops westward to protect Arizona instead of rushing them all eastward to the Villa Ahumada district, where there is also a great concentration of Carransa troops.

Officers and men cheerfully awaited today the ultimate word that would bring them into actual war. The big "four-point sevens" on Cotton Hill seemed to snuggle a little eagerly into their positions. There was a new briskness in all camps.

MEXICAN WAR FUNDS

Chairman of House Ways and Means Committee Against Extra Taxation

WASHINGTON, June 27.-War with Mexico will be financed by the sale of "war bonds" of the United States, if open and extended hostilities develop out of the crisis now confronting the country. Finan-cial leaders of the Administration have decided that if finds heaving argument the decided that if funds become necessary they will accept the suggestion of Democratic Congressional leaders and raise the money from bond sales, the original issue to be probably \$500,000,000.

Conferences between Majority Leader Kitchin, chairman of the House Ways and Means Committee, and Secretary McAdoo of the Treasury Department developed this plan. The House leader made clear his opinion that no effort should be made to

supply funds through taxation.
