U.S. AVIATION CORPS READY TO AID ARMY

Propeller Troubles Righted and Machines Are Available for Mexico

WASHINGTON, June 29 .- That the aviation branch of the Signal Corps is at last ready to play its part in the Mexican situation is the belief expressed by high army officials here as a result of several sucsensful flights reported to have recently taken place on the border. One machine is now with General Pershing.

A solution of the propeller troubles has been found, and experts declars they will noon be able to use the 12 available ma-chines with safety.
