VODKA TO BE PERMANENTLY

BANNED FROM CZAR'S EMPIRE Speaker in Duma Says Peasants Drink Cologne Instead of Liquor

PETROGRAD, June 29.—The bill providing for the permanent prohibition of vodka came up in the Duma yesterday for the first time. The session was given over to a discussion of the effectiveness of the present regulations forbidding the sale of liquor and the advisability of perpetuating the advantages of the increased prosperity evidenced throughout the country since the imperial decree at the beginning of the

Quoting the figures covering 11 months of 1915, in which, despite the prohibitory regulations, nearly 4,000,000 vedros—a vedro equaling three and one-quarter gallons—of Government liquor had been sold, one speaker asserted that drunkenness was becoming as prevalent as before the war, and declared that measures should be taken to strengthen the laws now in operation.

Drunkenness, continued the speaker, also had been increased by the imbibition of large quantities of furniture polish, cau de cologne and other substitutes for liquor consumed by the peasant population.

The measure making the prohibition permanent will be put to a vote at an early date, and it is expected will be passed with little expectition.
