RECORD HOLIDAY RUSH TO RESORTS FOR FOURTH

Transportation Facilities of All Lines Out of City Taxed to Limit

A new record is being set today in the rush of Philadelphians to the seasons and other resorts for the holiday. Starting Saturday moon, and continuing today, thousands of Philadelphians left this city to apend Independence Day elsewhere.

Transportation officials said it was the greatest holiday exodus in the history of the city. All of the transportation facil-ities leading from the city were taxed to their capacity and even the trolley lines are crowded with the holiday throngs.

Traffic at Broad street station during the 14 hours starting Saturday evening greater than in any similar period the structure was erected, according to Assistant Station Master Morgan, Condins were similar at the Reading Terminal.

Both the Reading and the Pennsylvania lines were taxed to their fullest capacity to handle the crowds that flocked to the scanbore to spend the holldays.

The record-breaking exodus this year is ue partly to the good weather, and also to the fact that many Philadelphia business

houses closed on Saturday until Wednes-day, and gave their employes an oppor-tunity to enjoy a vacation of four days.

The banks will be open for business to-day, and so will the Stock Exchange and department stores. Among those who have closed their shops until after Independence Day are the Walnut Street Business Asso-diation, the Commercial Exchange, Chamber of Commerce, Grocers' and Importers' Exchange and the Board of Trade.


