Four Hundred Members of Organization Inaugurated by Miss Ellen Mary Cassatt Appeared in Their Khaki Uniforms in a Pageant at Lawndale Yesterday

IT REALLY is remarkable how wonder-fully the Girl Scout idea, which has been taken up here by Ellen Mary Cassatt. been taken up here by Ellen Mary Cassatt, has caught hold, so to speak, and at least 400 hundred girls have joined the ranks, numbering among their members girls in Miss Cassatt's own walk of life, wageearners, teachers, playground instructors, secretaries and women in various other professions. To me it seems very delightful that there should be this sort of camaraderie among all classes, and I congratulate the girls who have gotten together and started this bound-to-behealthful exercise. Imagine, the society was only inaugurated on June 15, and so great has been the demand for member ship it has been necessary to open an office and see people by appointment.

The girls appeared yesterday for the first time in public and looked most attractive in their khaki camp suits as they marched and drilled out at Lawndale. They are planning to go to camp later in the summer, and there are certain tests which each must pass through before receiving a badge from headquarters.

The motto of the Girl Scouts is "Be Prepared." They are not, I understand, affiliated with the Boy Scouts in any way. but are a sort of sister organization.

Many persons motored out to Lawn dale yesterday to witness the pageant, which began at 9 o'clock. Associated with Ellen Mary Cassatt in the work are Rosalie Dolan, who, like Ellen Mary, is a great lover of outdoors, and who rides a great deal. Gwen Martin, daughter of Judge Martin, is also on the executive board, as is Sidney Ellis, the charming daughter of Mr. and Mrs. William Struthers Ellis, and who is engaged to young Radcliffe Cheston, Jr. Ellen Mary Cassatt is the daughter of Mrs. Gardner Cassatt, and Miss. Dolan's parents are Mr. and Mrs. Clarrie Dolan. They tell me that in 35 States there are Girl Scouts, and the tests which they have to undergo include cooking, sewing, first aid, housekeeping, nature study, laundering, music, swimming, gardening, painting, photography, marksmanship and various other kinds of things.
