

WITHDRAWAL OF U. S. FORCE FROM MEXICO EXPECTED AT BORDER

Columbus Believes Orders Will Be Issued Soon—No Excuse Seen for Troops Below Line Now

GUARDSMEN ON DUTY

COLUMBUS, N. M., July 5.—Among military men here today a feeling is growing that orders will be given in a short time for the withdrawal of the American expedition from Mexico, provided Carranza makes no hostile move.

However, no step which could be interpreted as preliminary to withdrawal has been taken from appearances at this base. The roads along the expedition's communication lines still are being repaired and supplies are piling up in the American camps.

Unofficial information reaching here is to the effect that General Peching personally favors withdrawal if there is to be no intervention. Establishment of heavy border garrisons and patrols to guard against bandit raids probably would follow retirement from Mexico. In this connection it is said that the militia probably would be placed on the border indefinitely.

The high authorities here pointed out today that the continued presence of the United States troops in the present position in Mexico had little justification.

They only saw the men of the 10th Army, armed with their rifles and bayonets and waving their hands in a friendly way.
