#### Hotels and Cabarets Say They Will Disobey and Go to Courts

ATLANTIC CITY, July 7 .- The usual idaummer wrangle over Sunday amusements has started again. Last night orders were lasued from the City Hall that all amusements should be close Sundays from midnight to midnight.

None of the piers or theatres giving Sunday "sacred" concerts and none of the motion-picture theatres received the notice, but the hotels and cabarets which furnish music for the entertainment of their guests did. The orders also apply to games such as skeeball, pingpong and howling.

Interviews with the managers of many of the amusement places show that most of them will refuse to obey the order unless all theatren, plers and motion-picture houses are brought under the ban. They say that the amended city ordinance, which allows such places to keep open and make it a mice such places to keep open and make it a misdemeanor for other amusements to run, is illegal as class legislation.

A fight is now on in the Court of Errors and Appeals of the State against this ordi-A decision will not be rendered until September.

Under the ordinance passed a year ago the owners of amusement places may be fined from \$1 to \$200 for each offense and Imprisoned for 30 days if the fine is not paid. Several managers said they would keep open and if fined would appeal, thus staving off further prosecutions until late in the autumn.
