# SOUTH AMERICAN PEACE MENACED BY NEW PACT

Peru and Venezuela Plan to Take Territory Claimed by Colombia and Ecuador

WASHINGTON, July 11 .- War in South America is threatened, with Peru and Venezuela on one side and Colombia and Ecuador on the other.

Official dispatches received in Latin-American diplomatic quarters report that Vene-suoia and Peru have entered into a secret agreement to take possession of vast tracts of territory on their frontiers, the right to which has long been disputed by the other two countries named.

It had been reported that Colombia and Peru had approached an understanding of their difficulties and that an arbitration was in contemplation. An award in the dispute between Venezuela and Colombia was made by Spain in 1891.

The four legations here profess to have little knowledge of the situation. Not long ago Secretary Lansing proposed that all the Latin-American republics bind themselves by treaty with the United States to arbitrate their boundary disputes. Noth-

ing came of the suggestion.

A Buenos Aires dispatch announces that the Argentine Minister to Paraguay and the Foreign Minister of Paraguay have signed a commercial treaty providing for free interchange of products, with certain exceptions. It is probable that Argentina will conclude similar treaties with Brazil, Chili, Bolivia and Uruguay.
