FIELDER CRITICISED BY DENTISTS' HEAD

Politics in Appointment to State Board, Dr. Henry Fowler Charges

ARDURY PARK, N. J., July 12.—The failure of Governor Fielder to appoint to the State Board of Registration and Examination in Dentistry the men selected by the New Jersey State Dental Society last year was criticised by President Dr. Henry Fowler, of Harrison, at the opening of the society's 46th annual convention here today.

"We feel this has been a grave mistake," said Doctor Fowler, "and are justified in this belief by the many years of unqualified success in eliminating politics from this non-political, educational examining board."

Doctor Fowler recommended that the legislative committee draft and present to the next Legislature a bill designed to restore the high standard of professional education required in the dental law of 1915, the effect of which he said had been destroyed, according to decision of the Attorney General's office, by a subsequent law which let down the bars for students who had been in school at the time the original law was passed.

After paying glowing tributes to the men who responded to the call for service at the border, Doctor Fowler recommended the organization of an army dental corps, subject to call as needed, and the placing of such equipment as might be needed also subject to call.

He proposed the appointment of a committee to arrange for the dental law of 1920, when the society will be 50 years old, and also suggested an annual field day when the dentists should get together for outdoor sports, trapezing, etc.

COP DOESN'T REMEMBER HIS WEDDING AT ELKTON

Answers Wife's Plea for Support—He Wasn't Intoxicated, She Says

Nell Maguire, a policeman attached to the 23rd and Thompson streets station and living at 2307 Jefferson street, denied today all knowledge of a wedding ceremony which made him the husband of Bertha Glasgow Maguire in Elkton, Md., last April.

The wife denied that the blueshirt was intoxicated when he was married. She produced a letter from the clergyman in Elkton who performed the ceremony, saying that Maguire was perfectly sober when he was married.

Maguire is temporarily suspended from the police force for neglect of duty.

PERSONALS

RULES AND REGULATIONS FOR QUARANTINE OF INFANTILE PARALYSIS (Acute Anterior Poliomyelitis) adopted by the Health Board of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania July 11, 1916.

1. Upon receipt by the health authorities of a report of a case of infantile paralysis, the health officer of the locality in which the case is reported shall immediately cause to be ascertained the residence of the patient, and the name of the person or persons who have been in contact with the patient within the period of incubation of the disease.

2. The patient or patients shall remain in the home in which they were first reported, and shall not be removed from the home until they have been examined by the health officer and found to be free from the disease.

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4. All persons who have been in contact with the patient or patients shall be examined by the health officer and found to be free from the disease.
