CATHOLICS HERE RAISE \$47,573 PETER'S PENCE

Report Shows Gain for This Year of \$3000 for Pope's

'NO BIG SHED,' DATESMAN SAYS OF AUDITORIUM

Director Declares Mayor Doesn't Want Cheap Hall on Parkway.

When asked why the plans to build a municipal auditorium had been altered so as to more than double the cost of con-struction, Director Datesman, of the De-partment of Public Safety, said: "Mayor Smith and the members of his cabinet did not want to build a big shed between a magnificent library building and the art

In defending the changes from a \$1,500,-660 building to one that will likely cost the city \$4,000,000 to complete the Director added:

"It is the function of the city administration to think shead for the people. It is not thinkable from the people's point of view to vote to spend twenty millions on the Parkway, to have it disfigured with a building such as one costing a million and a half would be; that is, when you compare it with the other edifices that are to be "As I understand it, the people have

"As I understand it, the people have given their sanction to a continuing program of building by voting an additional loan for the public library, and also by sanctioning the Mayor's addition of \$20.600 to the last loan for the auditorium.

"As I have said. I do not know the exact estimates on the auditorium. But it may be said, in a general way, that they

will run something over three million. I take it, that a further loan, for whatever money will be necessary, will come before the people next year. In the meantime work is expected to be begun on the building early this fall.

"I think these figures are conservative hen the fact is taken into consideration that the cost of the proposed original build-ing in 1911 has risen to something like \$7,100,000, and further plans have been made to increase the cost of the library building."


