The Rev. T. T. Mutchler, M.D., general secretary of the Philadelphia Sahbath Association and an officer of the Alliance, defended both organizations in an interview

Doctor Mutchler and the other officers of the Alliance and the Sabbath Associa-tion were described as, "frankly speaking, a pack of fools" by the Rev. Doctor Steele n his reply to Doctor Mutchler's letter of protest against the Sunday activities at the fresh-Air Farms.

"LIBERAL SUNDAY" A MENACE. The general secretary of the Sabbath secciation sees in the tendency of the pub-for a "liberal Sunday" a menace to the Church, because offerings, the main re-source for maintenance, would be seriously reduced by declining attendance. The closing of candy stores and cigar stores on Sunday is also necessary as part of the program, Doctor Mutchler believes.

"It is important that children be relieved from the temptation to spend their pennies in candy stores on their way to Sunday school," a report of the Sabbath Associa-

Doctor Mutchler asserts that the only efective way to prevent Sunday baseball. which he believes the most demoralizing influence to which the public is exposed or Sundays, is to appeal to local authorities to arrest the offenders and put them in jail if they fall to pay their fines. "A rigid enforcement of the Sunday law," Doctor Mutchler said, "is "necessary if proper observance is to be paid and the day respected in accordance with the statute."

AGAINST SUNDAY GOLF. On Sunday golf the Sabbath Association

"It is reported that golf is being played on the Lord's Day in some of the outlying parts of our city and in parts of the State just beyond the city limits. As golf comes under the head of 'sports,' which are prohibited by law, we feel that intelligent, thinking people should not thus wittingly desecrate the day and openly violate a known law.

We communicated with the golf clubs so far as we could reach them, and in addition to our letter, in which we appealed to them to discontinue the Sunday game, we sent them copies of the law. We trust our appeal was given due consideration." Golf is played on Sunday at every club in and nearby Philadelphia.

"It has seemed to us that moral suasion should be sufficient to induce these wellthe do people to discontinue this practice."

the report continues. "Wherever these games are played we earnestly ask our friends to confer with those in charge and to urge upon them to discontinue the Sunday sports."

Of the deleterious effect of an open Sun day upon church revenue, the Lord's Day Alliance report says: "As a result of the open Sunday there has been a falling off of church attendance, benevolent contribu-tions and revenues for the support of the

"The ideal Sunday, as I view it," said Doctor Mutchler, "is attendance at church in the morning for adults and at Sunday school for the children.
