L the papers that this or that has been sent to Belgium, or France, or Germany, or any of the warring countries, realize for a minute what a great work the Emergency Aid of this city has been doing and is doing and with what perfect system. A look at the recent report of activities during the year gives one a alight idea of the extraordinary amount of work accomplished by that busy and untiring society.

Let me give you an idea of the number of branches and who is at the head of each and who have given of their time, money and energy and best of all their heartfelt charity for the benefit of the poor and wounded and suffering and dying on the other side of the water; and who stand readier to help our own here at home should necessity call—the good self-sacrificing women of this city and State. Among the committees are the Armenien Relief, with Mrs. George H. Lorimer as chairman; Mrs. Bayard Henry heads the Belgium Relief Committee, which has numerous special funds, among them donations to support the American ward in King Albert's Hospital, the Maternity Home for Belgium Gentlewomen, the support of beds in the Convalescent Home for Belgian Officers at Cannes, France, and the Cardinal Mercier Fund.

Miss Mabel Brice has charge of the packing and I could not begin to recount all the things she and her associates have packed off for that brave little country which has so won the admiration of the whole world.

Mrs. E. Burd Grubb, an Englishwoman herself, for she was Miss Violet Sopwith, of England, before she married the late General Grubb, is the chairman of the British Relief of the Emergency Aid, while the chairman of the British-American War Relief Fund is Mrs. Bob Strawbridge, who lived for many years in England. She was Anita Berwind, you know, and considered one of our most beautiful women. Mrs. Cognelius Stevenson heads the French Relief Committee, and the recognition of her work will be remembered when, in May, she was decorated by France for the services rendered to that country. The Italian Committee is headed by Mrs. Benjamin Miller, while Mrs. Robert von Moschzisker is chairman of the Polish Association. The Philadelphia County Auxiliary of the American Red Cross has Mrg. Reed Morgan for chairman. Of course, the Russian Committee has Mrs. William Ellis Scull at its head, for Mrs. Scull is a great lover of Russia, and Miss Nina Lea is in charge of Serbia. I wonder as I read all the countries named, why there has been no relief fund for Lithuania, which is suffering as badly as Poland, I am told. Perhaps when we learn more of these people something can be done for them also. It certainly is gratifying to every American woman, be she actively engaged in the work or not, to know what her sisters have accom-

plished, and with me, I am sure, she

wishes them godspeed in their future


