\$400,000,000 IN GOLD IS COMING INTO UNITED STATES

About \$3,000,000 a Day May Be Expected for British Account

NEW YORK, July 19.-Four hundred millions in gold is coming into the United States during the next six months. The British Government is planning to dscharge the obligations of the firms and agents in the United States by shipment of this vast sum via Canada. About \$3,000,000 a day in the yellow metal may be expected from now on, most of it coming from Ottawa. Some will come direct to New York from London— like \$20,000,000 delivered today to J. P. Morgan & Co., fiscal agents here for the Allies, which arrived on the Cunard liner Saxonia.


