DEFENDS SCHUYLKILL ARSENAL Colonel Penrose Denies Statements of Delay Made in Congress

Lieut. Col. George H. Penrose, comman-dant of the Philadelphia Quartermaster's Depot, denied the statements made in Con-gress last Saturday by Senators Penrose, Lee and Wadsworth that the delay of troops in reaching the border was caused by the failure of the Schuylkill Arsenal to supply them promptly with the necessary equipment. He said the Senators must have confused the Schuylkill Arsenal with the Frankford Arzenal.
"I am unable to account for the apparent

'I am unable to account for the apparent attempt to place the blame on us,' he said. "In the eight days and nights following the receipt of orders we sent out supplies fill-ing 212 trains. It has been our duty to supply every State along the Atlantic coast lown as far as Georgia. This has been done promptly."

The entire Italian village which the Metro company had just built in the center of Brighton Beach race track for the screen production of "Romeo and Juliet" was com-pletely destroyed by the terrific storm that swept over New York and environs last week. More than 50 men were employed on the construction work, with only a few hours more labor to mark its completion. The severe storm, with wind blowing off the ocean at hurricans velocity, in less than 50 minutes destroyed the work of many weeks. Metro suffered a financial loss of several thousand dollars, in addition to the big loss that the delay will cost. Arthur Shipley, who was in charge of the work during the absence of Edward Schulter, technical director at the Metro-Quality studios, had a narrow escape from

serious injury. When the storm arose Mr. Shipley directed a group of men to arrange guide ropes and heavy wires over the structure at various points, and fasten them with stakes driven into the ground. He was on top of a high scaffolding with three men, when a sudden sweep of wind car-ried the structure over and sent the men toppling to the ground. A few seconds later a bolt of lightning struck a telephone pole which was not more than 29 feet from where the men lay on the ground, stunned. Mr. Schulter, who was in the Metro-Quality Studio near Columbus Circle, New York, anticipating that the storm might damage the construction work at Brighton Beach, hurried thereshin an automobile. When he arrived the result of his handiwork, and the most elaborate and artistic set he ever designed and built, was leveled to the ground and scattered over the inclosed arens. Had it not been for the fact that Mr. Schulter constructed the outdoor set on more substantial and different lines than any similar set was ever built it would have been a total loss. In making the many buildings, which were faithful Verona, Italy, in the fourteenth century, Mr. Schulter directed their construction with a view of taking them down and cart-ing them to the Metro studios afterward for future use.


