

NANCY WYNNE IS INTERESTED IN NEWS OF NATIONAL SERVICE SCHOOL

School to Be Held on Lake Geneva, Wis., From August 15 to September 15 and at Narragansett Pier From September 6 to 20—Many Will Attend

IT IS interesting to read in the circular which Miss Elizabeth Elliott Poe has issued to those who are members of the First National Service School, which was held in Chevy Chase during May, that there will be two other camps before the summer season is over and that an alumnae has been formed. Miss Poe says as follows:

"The Alumnae Society of the First National Service School has been formed and all students of the First National Service School who attended the school, whether graduates or not, and all members of the committees are eligible for membership therein. (Here a statement is made regarding the dues, then Miss Poe continues in her circular):

"The National Service School Committee of the Woman's Section of the Navy League begs leave to announce that there will be a National Service School, held under the auspices of the Main Committee in accordance with the plan of the First National Service School by the Chicago members of the Woman's Section of the Navy League, at Lake Geneva, Wis., from August 15 to September 15, 1916. First National Service School students desiring to attend will please apply at once to William M. Lewis, 110 South Dearborn street, Chicago, Ill.

"A National Service School will be held at Narragansett Pier, R. I., from September 6 to 20. The membership in the latter school is limited to 100, and those desiring to enroll are advised to do so at the earliest possible moment. Applications should be made to Mrs. Irving H. Chase, Narragansett Pier, R. I. Uniforms used at the First National Service School can be used at either of the new schools.

"The certificate to be given to all those who passed satisfactorily in the various branches of instruction at the First National Service School will be sent out before August 1. The delay in sending them has been due to the difficulty in assembling all the marks.

"The roll of honor of the First National Service School is still open in this time of national crisis to all students who can induce ten other women to perfect themselves in some form of national service training. Many of our students have started classes in surgical dressings in their homes and are co-operating in other ways with the American Red Cross—the big brother of the army and navy.

"May I point out to National Service students the special responsibility which is theirs at the present time. The eyes of the entire country are upon them to see if they are going to put the training they received into practical use, and they must not fail to do the work of the school be unjustly criticized.

"At the national headquarters of the Woman's Section of the Navy League we have classes running both night and day in the making of surgical dressings, etc. We have the services of Red Cross nurses as instructors and we are endeavoring to make a goodly supply of these articles for the use of our soldiers, sailors and marines. Any National Service School student who cannot help personally in making the surgical dressings, etc., can assist the good work a great deal by contributions in any amount raised among friends and sent to national headquarters for the work in progress here.
