Francis Shunk Brown, tho was attorney for the pig men, has in-leated that the Superior Court decision a final, and that an appeal to the Supreme

Court is not warranted.

The only piggery which has a chance to remain in the city is one which is noted as sanitary by inspectors, and is within the area fixed by Councils.


