WATER SHORTAGE NEEDS VARIEGATED BILLS **NEW MAIN FOR HELPING** SOUTH PHILADELPHIA

Section, Now Dry Above Second Floor, Should Be Supplied by Separate Pipes and Plant

COST WILL BE \$5,300,000

The bitterly complained of water shortage in South Philadelphia is a condition that city officials frankly confess they cannot successfully cope with for a long time to come or until the citizens authorize a loan of at least \$5,300,000, to be expended on an express main and pumping station to carry water from Torresdale directly to points south and east.

Many suggestions designed to remedy the shortage and to give Southeast Philadel-phia the same adequate supply furnished fortunate sections have been ad more fortunate sections have been ad-vanced, but all have been eliminated with the decision that an express main south of Third and Market is the only thing that will bring permanent and definite relief. In the \$42,000,000 general loan there is an of \$500,000 for extension of the water term of \$506,000 for extension of the water marvice, and this money will be used mainly to strengthen the methods of distribution mouth of Market street. This will afford some improvement, but not enough to equalise conditions all over the city.

Tentative plans for a new pumping station and a new express main have been dis-cursed by Director Datesman, of the De-partment of Public Works, and Chief Carle-E. Davis, of the Water Bureau, but the manifest improbability of any money being borrowed for this purpose in the near future makes the work done so far of little

The one ray of hope held out to the The one ray of hope held out to the people suffering from the lack of an ade-quate water supply lies in the fact that municipal financiers have already taken up, in a more or less definite way, the idea having the city authorize a future loan to provide the \$5,500,000 needed for water, an almost similar sum for a new Blockley and a provision for the continuance of the work on the sewage disposal plant.

Water shortages are always felt the most beenly in the summer months, and as this is the season when the demands are heav-lest in the central and northern sections of the city, conditions are always aggravated at a time when sanitary and health reasons would dictate the necessity for the largest adally consumption averaging from 216,000-of to 220,000,000 gallons, which is the out ide capacity of the plants with the single exception of West Philadelphia, which still has a working margin to go upon. South Philadelphia, the section farthest

South Philadelphia, the section farthest removed from the base of supplies at Tor-readale, is naturally the part of the city to suffer, and at one time it was proposed to establish a pumping station somewhere near the middle of the city to force the mear the middle of the city to force the water south. This plan has been abandoned because it has been pointed out by engineers that the supply is small when it reaches and leaves the central section of the city, and that a pumping station therefore would

at best be a makeshift proposition. The impossibility of establishing a filtration plant with direct service along the shores of the Delaware south of the city has been of the water after it has passed through the city.

The question of waste enters to some extent in the trouble which South Philadel-phia is experiencing at this time. Accord-ing to Chief Davis, water users of this city have never been taught to husband the supply and use care in order that others may not be inconvenienced. Steps to put a stop to this evil are not being taken, and during the next six months \$25,000 worth of meters will be installed in factories believed to be wasteful of the supplies allowed them through the old spigot rates. The prevention of waste would give a better supply for the most distant points.

In discussing the water shortage Chief DRAIN fogua Ba who cannot get a supply in the upper stories of their homes and tenements are dissatisfied. It certainly must be annoying and inconvenient, but the hardest time is over for them this year. The demands on the water supply are heaviest in July, and in August and September records show the supply is more nearly adequate. The ques-tion has been gone into and the only way to bring about an equalization appears to be the laying of an express main especially to serve the southern section of the city. The laying of such a main would make necessary additional pumping facilities and this undertaking will cost the city about \$5.590,000. I estimate the financial need at \$6,000,000, but Councils have given us \$500,000, which will be used mainly in \$500,000, which wi South Philadelphia We have 1700 miles of water pipe in the city and the demands just now are way above normal. It is hard to blame present conditions on any one cause. Of course if big users would exercise care there would be just that much more water to go around, but this saving would help only, not remedy entirely. What we must have is an express main south. That would place every section main south. That would place every section of the city on the same plane and would put a stop to any further trouble. I sym-pathize with any pergens who suffer from lack of water, but fast now there seems no adequate remedy at hand. Just as soon as the money is provided the work can be undertaken, but until that time the central and northern sections of the city will conand northern sections of the city will co tinue to have an advantage over the south-

Can you put over the "dream trick" on the screen? Can you tell a tragic story and then "get out of it" by explaining that and then 'get out of it' by explaining that one of the characters just thought it all? Yes, you can, if you know how. Griffith did it in 'The Avenging Conscience'': Raoul Walsh did it in 'The Serpent," and George Melford does it in 'The House of the Golden Shutters," which came to the Stanley yes-torder. terday.

But it must be admitted that Mr. Melford doesn't do it with quite the engrossing suc-cess of the other two efforts. At best it is a difficult and thankless trick. It lets the director indulgs in a good deal of tragedy without an unhappy ending. But as the audience isn't "in on the know" till the finish, either the tragedy of the dream must be made strong and well-reasoned so as to be able to stand by itself, or else the awakening must have some decidedly

novel element. The new Lasky-Paramount feature at the Stanley fails insofar as Director Melford presents a dream story with a sudden pasm of villainy on the part of the heroes of the whole film, which would have to be explained and motivated all round the block keep the audience satisfied. Saying it's dream takes some of the curse off, but not all.

The film is very well done. Wallace Reid and Cleo Ridgely do their familiar and skill-ful teamwork, with a good cast to back them. GEN. DAVID M'M. GREGG, **GETTYSBURG HERO, DEAD**

Last Union Officer of His Rank Succumbs in Reading at

83 Years

READING, Pa., Aug. 8 .- General David McMurtrie Gregg, \$3 years old, the last of the Union officers holding the rank of general at the battle of Gettysburg, died at his home here last night after an ill ness of several months. He was in good health

up to late last spring. While a student at the University of Lewisburg he was oppointed to a cadetship at West Point in 1851, and was graduated in 1855. He served in the West in numer-

ous battles in Indian uprisings, and was made a captain in May, 1861, when the war broke out. The next January he was made a colonel and in November, 1862, was made a brigadier general of cavalry, when only 31 years old. His 10,000 cavalry-men are credited by many historians with having saved the Union cause at Gettys-burg, forcing General Jeb Stuart to reburg, forcing G tire from Little Round Top at a critical

In February, 1874, President Grant ap-pointed General Gregg United States Con-sul to Prague, Bohemia, but he resigned six months later and came home, locating in Reading. In 1891 he was elected Auditor General of Pennsylvania and served three years. years.
