DR. ALEXANDER BROWNE

Civil War Veteran Dies of Heart Disease at Shenandoah

Dr. Alexander Browns, of 5517 Girard avenue, a vetoran of the Civil War, died of heart disease Thursday night at Shenandeah, where he was visiting. Doctor Browns was 73 years old. He was a son of Alexander Browns, who at one time was Register of Wills and a prominent Democrat. Doctor Browns will be buried Tuesday.

He was born in 1845. He graduated in pharmacy and at the outbreak of the Civil War entered the navy. He was surgeon steward on board a war vessel for two years and later left the vessel at New Orleans and took up duty at a fever hospital there, where he remained until the end of the

Upon his return to this city he entered the medical school of the University of Pennsylvania, from which he was gradu-ated in 1876. He was a prominent Mason and a member of Ross Post, Grand Army of the Republic. He was awarded a long service medal by Congress several years
