The best war play offered since "Birth" and the only one dealing with the present conflict which is at all worthy, is "Shell 43" at the Arcadia. Mr. C. Gardner Sullivan, a writer for Thomas H. Ince, has written a glorious script and from it Mr. Thomas H. Ince's directors have evolved a thrilling, almost magnificent film, H. B. Warner is the spy, one of the best portrayals of the screen this year. Mr. Warner has been shelved for Douglas Fairbanks, whom he surpasses in every respect except humor. He is capable, intelligent, a real screen actor. And the putting on of the work, the spinning of plot and counter-plot, the mystery, are all superbly handled. Half-way through the film one is still in doubt way through the film one is still in doubt as to the spy's true allegiance. The end is a splendid climax. Margaret Thompson had the principal supporting role, although Mr. Thomas H. Ince, the producer, put Miss Enid Markey's name first. Miss Markey was in the film. Except for that, "Shell 43" is a masterpiece in a small way, and it is the one film of the week which must not be missed. "Gloria's Romance." must not be missed.
