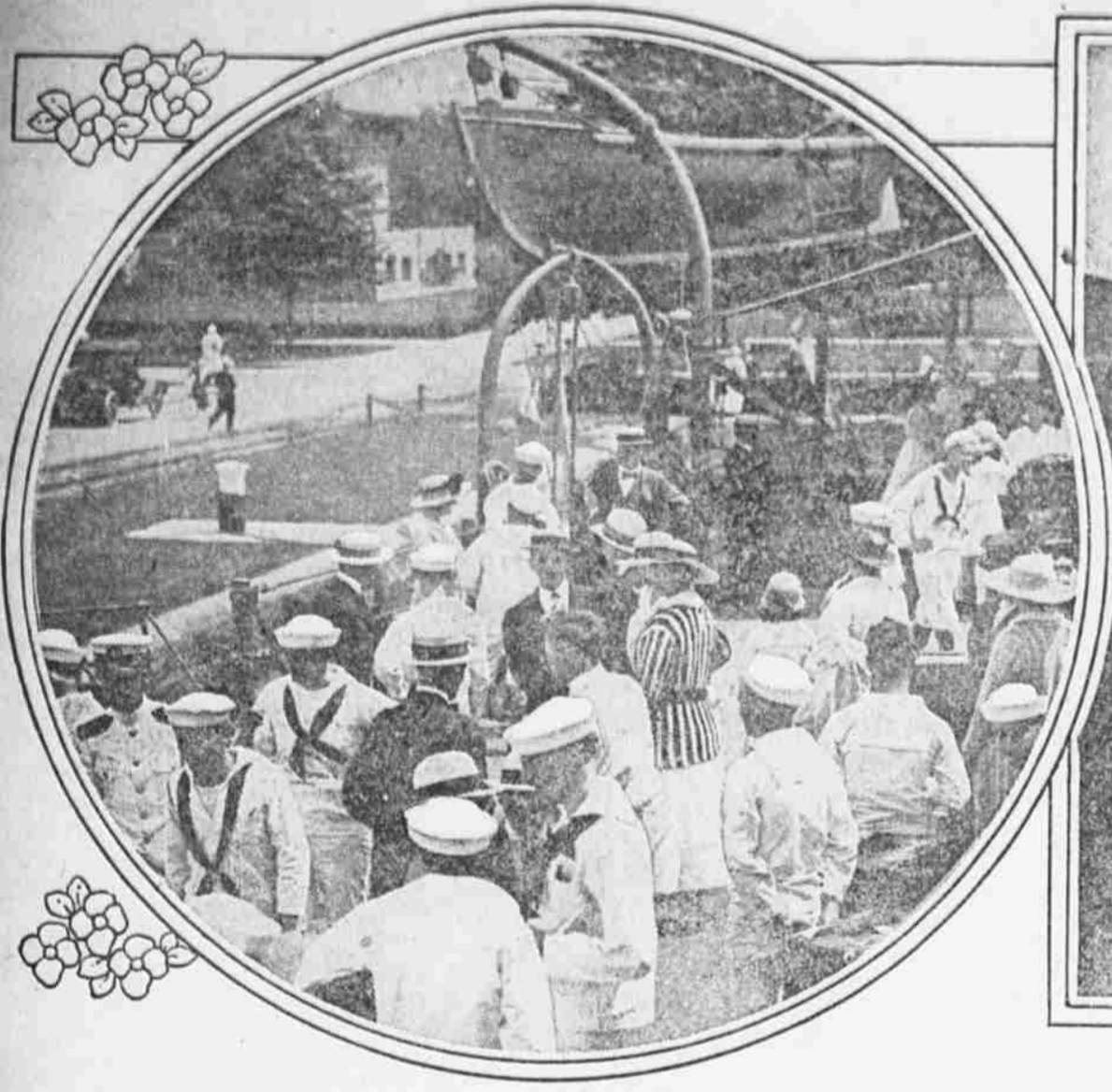




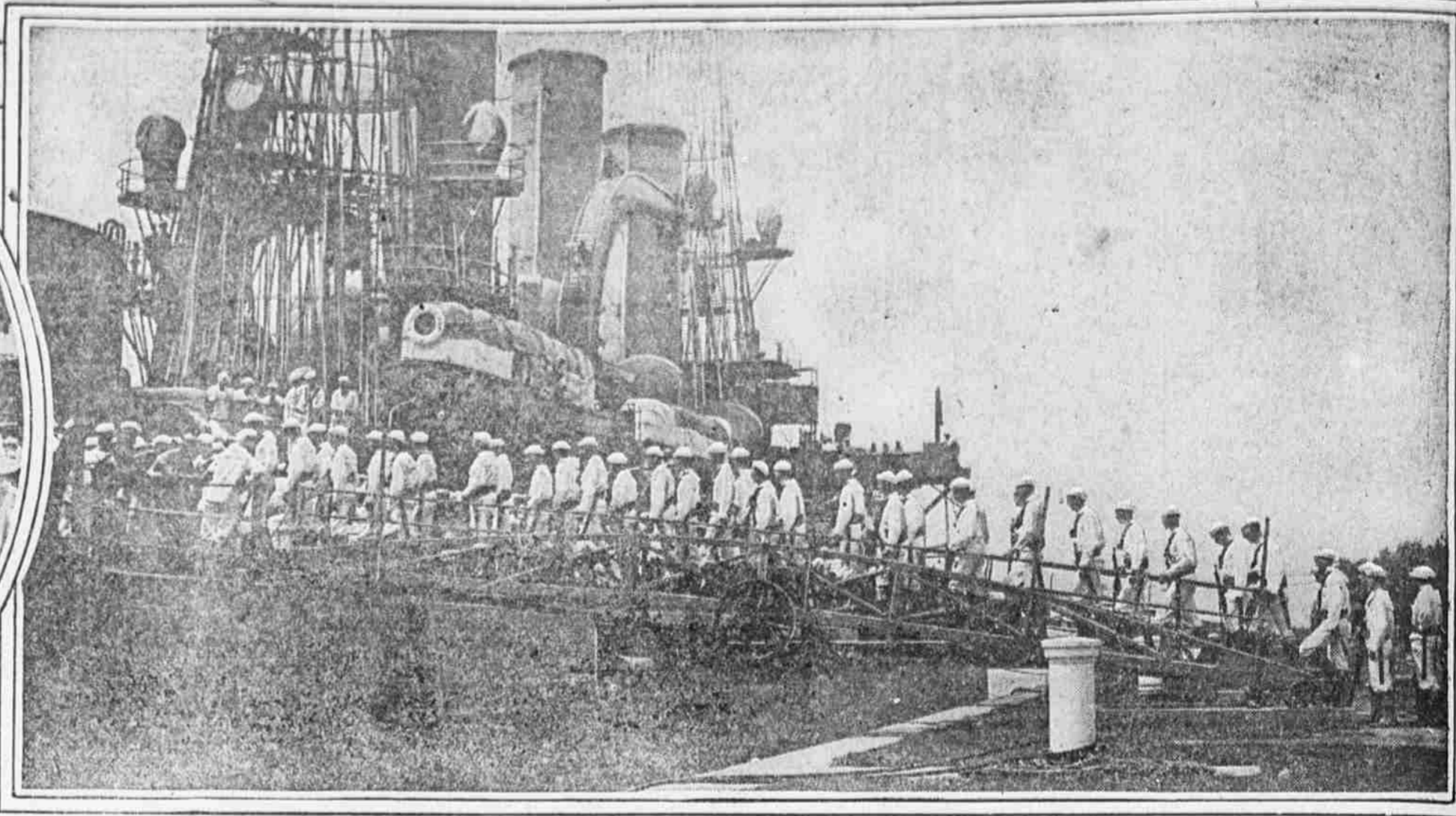

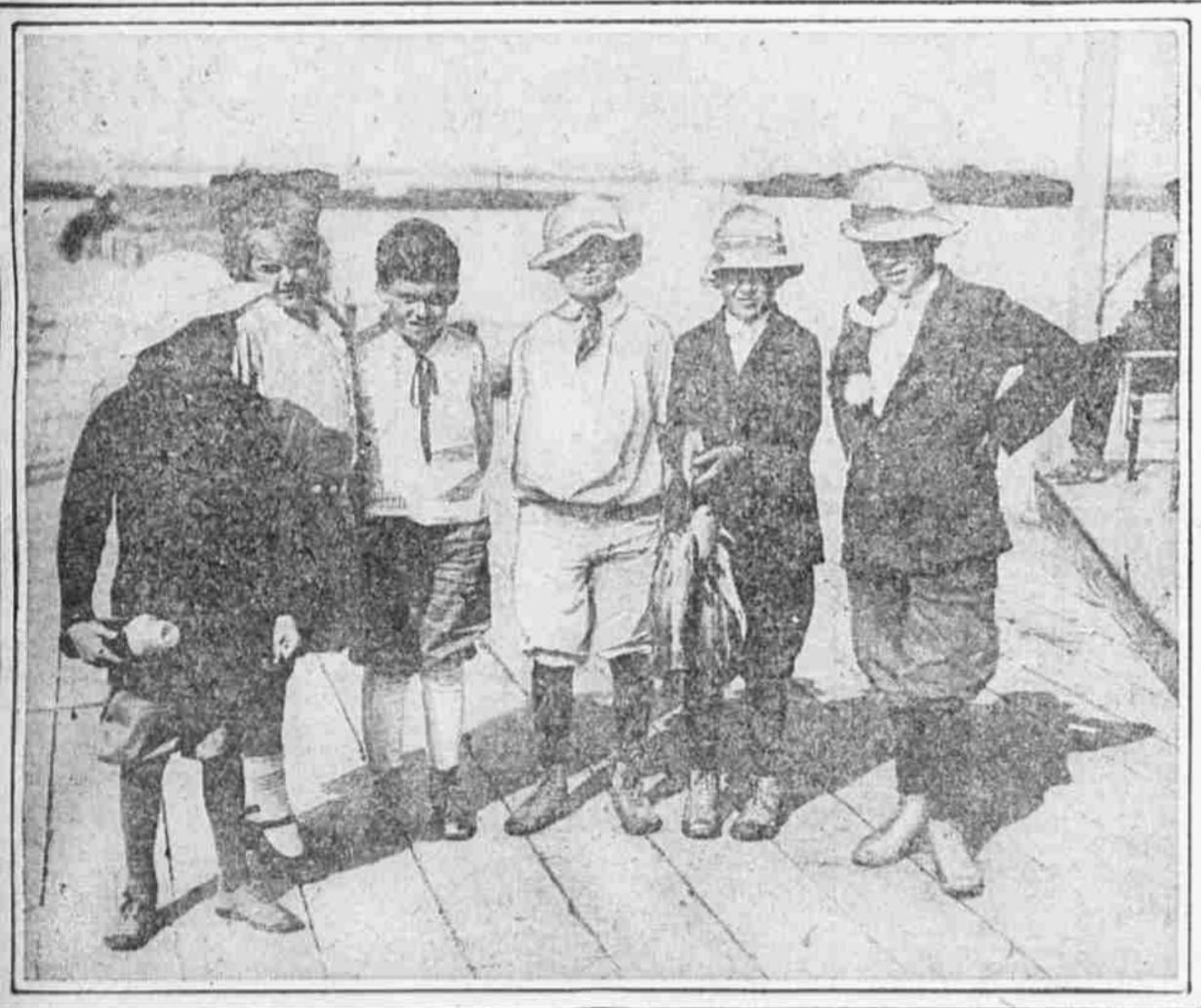
A DAY'S ACTIVITIES IN A BUSY WORLD GRAPHICALLY PORTRAYED BY THE CAMERA MAN



PART OF THE CROWD SAYING FAREWELL ON BOARD THE RHODE ISLAND



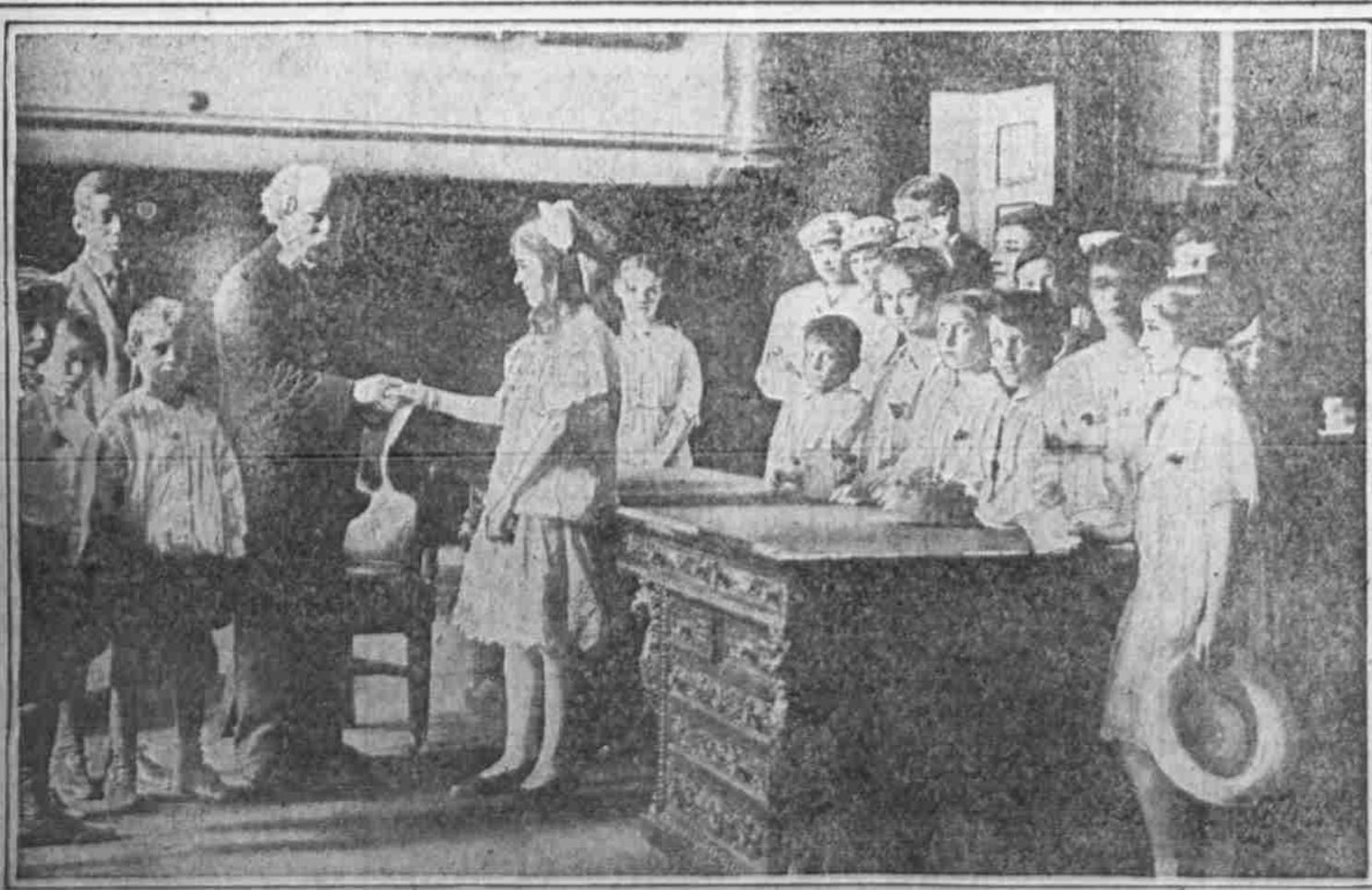
