league for the good of moving pictures. corresponding in many ways to the Drama League, which worked so hard for the stage and had several interesting results, has been formed. From the prospectus of the league the following is clipped to give readers an idea of the work to be done:

The Motion Picture Welfare League was formed by a group of young men and women interested in the possibilities of motion pictures as a factor in the life of a community. Realizing that in any business it is the consumer who has the power and right to specify what sort of goods he will have, the league is organizing the demand for motion pictures. It has been found that the demand is decidedly for a higher type of picture than is in general being shown at present, and so the activity of the league has resolved itself into a con-centration of the demand "for better and cleaner moving pictures."

Chapters of the league are being formed in every town that can possibly be reached. The newspapers of a community are the means for reaching the people, and in each case that newspaper which has the welfare of its people most closely at heart has been permitted to conduct the organization. Those persons who are interested in the problem are invited to become memtion. Those persons who are interested in the problem are invited to become mem-bers. No dues are collected, but members are pledged to maintain the ideals of the league by actively insisting that clean pic-tures be shown by refusing to patronize any other kind and by attending such pic-tures as the league indorses from time to

The league is being brought to the at-tention of every community by means of articles on various phases of the problem. These have been written by people emi-nent in many lines of civic and educational endeavor, such as Kate Bernard, the Rev. James A. Burns, Walter Prichard Eaton, Arthur Gulterman, Norman Hapgood, Anna S. Richardson and about 20 others. The articles are syndicated throughout the press and serve as the nucleus around which local thought is organized. An annual conven-tion of the league is planned, at which prepared lectures and informal discussions of the community's picture problems will be

At the same time that this organization has been taking place the league has found it convenient to open a scenario department, which handles such pictures as come up to the standards set by the league's members. Instead of using back writers, communication has been opened with about \$00 of the better class of fiction writers.

GASOLINE CUT MEANS FOR THE PICTURES | LITTLE; CHEAP IN SOUTH

Pennsylvanians Paying 3 to 4 Cents More Than Places Elsewhere, Despite Reduction

Philadelphia motorists today welcomed an announcement of a one-cent reduction in the price of gazoline, making it 21 cents a gallon to deniern and 23 cents at retail. Their jubilation was marred, however, by the fact that similar reductions announced in the Middle West and South showed that Philadelphians still are paying much more

Philadelphians still are paying much more for gasoline than the automobilists of other sections of the country.

Reductions of I cent were also announced by the Standard Oil Company in Chicago and in Indiana, Michigan, Illinota and Missouri and by the Texas Oil Company in the South. The cost of gasoline in these States, as shown by the anouncement of the reduction, makes them, a paradise for automotion. reduction, makes them a paradise for auto-mobilists, so far as the cost of fuel is con-

cerned.

In Chicago and Indianapolis the cost was reduced to 17½ cents a gallon to dealers. This is 3½ cents lower than in Philadelphia. In Kansas City the cost to dealers is now 17.8 cents a gallon, 3.2 cents a gallon cheaper than in this city.

On top of these announcements, the Texas Oil Company declared a cut of 10 cents a barrel on Caddo and De Seta light cents a barrel on Caddo and De Sola hand oil. This is the sixth cut in the price of Louisiana oils since July 25, and the other pipe line companies are expected to meet it. The present price of Caddo light is 25

it. The present price of Caddo light is 25 cents and De Sota light 85 cents.

Automobilists are looking to the end of the war for any material relief in the cost of gasoline. Before the war it was 13 cents a gallon in many places. In reviewing the factors that have caused the large increase in the price, the oil companies state that \$50,000,000 has been spent in sinking new wells, and that the number of automobiles in use in this country is increasing by leans in use in this country is increasing by leaps and bounds. The oil companies figure that 10,000,000 more barrels of gasoline will be required for the automobiles that will be manufactured during the next year.


