GOMPERS FOR WILSON AS FRIEND OF LABOR

Federation Chief Lauds President for Aiding Labor in Strike Negotiations

BALTIMORE, Aug. 29. — Samuel Gom-pers, president of the Federation of Labor, made a speech here last night in the interest of Wilson and Marshall on the Democratic national ticket.

Mr. Gompers refrained from out-and-out campaigning for President Wilson, but in effect he advised the laboring men of America to support the President for re-election and thus to repay the Democratic party for what he termed its efforts in their behalf. He left no doubt in the minds of his heariers of his disapproval of Hughes, whose speech of acceptance, he said, had revealed lack of grasp of the big issues of the day and the needs of the country.

His two most significant statements, and the ones most vigorously applauded, related directly to the President. One was:

"The Wilson Administration has accom pilehed everything that could have been ac-complished by war, and it has done this without shedding one drop of blood. No crepe hangs on the doorknob of America." The other, referring to Mr. Wilson's efforts to avert the threatened nation-wide railroad strike, was:

"The President has declared for an eighthour workday as a fundamental principle and has wreed that workers ought to have it. He has done splendid work in this crisis and I hope he will bring us out of this without the stoppage of one single train."
