ODDITIES AND NOVELTIES FOR THE PHONOGRAPH FAN

The Marimba and Balalaika on Recent Records-Vogue of the Ukulele and Hawaiian Stringed Insruments.

This week attention is given to a number unusual instruments and combinations. ne or other of these will diversify home chonograph programs with novelty. Many of them are of musical merit as de from heir oddity.

A most interesting combination of instruents—banjo, saxophone and piano—'n Van ps' Trio gives two live and spirited selec-ons. "Hill and Dale" is a fox-trot guaranand to liven things up wherever played. The brilliance of the banjo coupled with the somber tone of the saxophone makes a most interesting record. "Daly's Reel" is on the same record.

The Florentine Quartet is a combination of violin, cello, flute and harp. One of the cidest, but still one of the most popular examples of the music composed for the graceful minuet is the Boccherini composi-tion. The melody is exquisite, and it has a captivating, rhythmic swing most fascinat-ing. "Traumerei" is one of a group of smaller compositions, called "Childhood Scenea," It is probably the most beautiful of the entire group and is a universal favor-ite, beloved by old and young.

Ten minutes of delightful, novel enter-

tainment are offered in the form of "Medley of Irish Jigs." The medley is played by John J. Kimmel on the accordion, and is a revelation of the possibilities stored up in this small instrument. In the hands of Mr. Cimmel, the accordion gives the listener the impression of an entire string orchestra daying. A genuine Irish jig, played with true Irish ardor, is not an everyday occurrence. If you think you cannot dance an Irish jig. just listen to this medley. It will awaken some dormant impulse of Hibernian

—and you'll simply have to venture! Two well-known and delightful concert ces—the tuneful "Liebesfreund Waltz" nd a graceful Chaminade dance—are given by Charles Kellogg, "the Nature Singer," and the Victor Orchestra, and they seem especially appropriate for the exhibition of Kellogg's charming bird effects.

A well-known music lover on hearing the Hurtado Brothers' marimba orchestra at the Panama-Pacific Exposition exclaimed. "There is music to sit on a porch and listen to all night!" And ideal summer music are these Columbia recordings of marimba waltzes. Indeed, all the Hurtado marimba music will sound with added sweetness in the open air. Their octet plays Medley of Waltzes (G. Hurtado), and Faded Flowers Waltz (Strauss).

HAWAIIAN NOVELTIES

It would take new words to describe the clusive beauty of "Pua Mohala." This Hawaiian chorus with ukalele accompaniment is intricately harmonious and deeply effective music. The Hawaiian medley from the guitars of Helen Louise and Frank Ferera is one of the most varied and cleverly performed duets by these popular players of Hawaiian melodies. ning "hula" is the "genuine thing."

Helen Louise and Frank Ferera, with their Hawaiian guitars, are popular Hawallan players, who have given for September two more attractive numbers. The "Maui Aloha" is really a syncopated version of the favorite "Aloha Oe," and has volume enough to be used for dancing in rooms not too large. "Pua Carnation" is a "aliding" effect which has so taken the fancy of the American public.

For Victor the Russia Balalaika Orchestra resents two numbers which exhibit well he perfect ensemble and exquisite tone production of these gifted players.

The Hurtado Brothers Royal Marimba Band offers two fine standard waltzes, the "Blue Danube" and the "Southern Roses." There has been so much interest ex-pressed in the method of playing the Havallan guitar that a few words on this subject will be welcome to all admirers of the southern Pacific music. The guitar is an ordinary American instrument, but instead of being held upright by the left hand the guitar is laid flat across the knees. On the fingers of the right hand are slipped metal, thimblelike picks which pluck the strings, while the left hand fingers the frets by pressing down the strings with a metal bar. Excellent samples of the effects are "Manna Kea Medley," by Helen Louise and Frank Ferera, a Hawalijan guitar duet, and "That Ukalele Band." SOME UNUSUAL RECORDS Nevin's "Narcissus," played by the Gypsy Countess Verona on the czimbalom, is the most unique of Columbia's late recis the most unique of Columbia's late records. The genuine gypsy eximbalom is a rare instrument in this country—in fact, there are only one or two places in Amer-ica where it may be heard. The whimsical notes of "Narcissus" are peculiarly suited to the romantic, rich and resonant notes eyoked by the Countess from the czimbalom. In construction the czimbalom resembles the interior of a grand piano—the wire strings which are open before the player being struck by felted and weighted mailets.

"Zigeunerweisen," a czimbalom solo by the Countess, is one of the Columbia's late recordings.
