PLANS TO ELIMINATE WASTE OF WATER BY **NEW SERVICE METHODS**

Chief Davis Urges Change in Furnishing of Supply for Street Cleaning and Similar Purposes

WOULD REMEDY DEFECTS

New methods for supplying water for street cleaning and for other purposes of similar nature were advocated by Chief Carleton E. Davis, of the Bureau of Water, today. The plan would give additional comfort to many Philadelphians, Chief Davis said; would remedy many defects in the service and at the same time leave the fire hydrants—which are of the utmost importance for the preservation of the city—free and in perfect condition ready to cope with any emergency.

The city has used more water this summer than ever before in its history. Chief Davis explained. "At least all records were broken on August 24 last," he said, "when nearly 255,000,000 gallons were filtered at the city plants in one day. It is the largest amount on record in the bureau files."

This immense volume of water, in the opinion of the Chief, prophesies, no doubt, that "The worst is yet to come"; and regardless of the important problem of water and a new filtering plant which are confronting the bureau, other measures are needed to effect a real solution to the water problem, one which would serve the best problem, one which would serve the best interests of both city and citizens alike.

WASH PEGS NEAR FIRE HYDRANTS Chief Davis's plan, which he says would not entail any great expenditure of money, ealls for the installation of special wash pegs near five hydrains in special boxes opening flush on the pavement. The boxes would lock with keys to be distributed to persons authorized to use them. The page persons authorized to use them. The pegs would connect with one and one-half of two inch pipes entirely independent of the six-inch pipes connecting with the fire hydrants.

"It has been estimated that 75 per cent of the water used from fire hydrants is wasted," he said. "We have young Niagaras flowing down the streets on many occasions and causing an untold waste.

"The bureau. I feel sure, has no intention of depriving some of the younger inhabitants of the city of the chance of getting cooled off when the city is sizzling under a midsummer's, sun. Yet the practice of opening fire hydrants by unauthorized persons must ston.

Smaller pipes, accessible from boxes fush on the street, would answer the same purpose and while checking waste to a great extent would supply street cleaners and watering wagons with the water they need; flush playground streets, perhaps, and afford suitable accommodations for watertroughs, whether put up by the city or by charitable organizations.

"Systematic and widespread flushing of the streets now is insisted upon by health authorities as a preventive measure against the spread of infantile paralysis. This means an additional use of water when the resources of the bureau are strained to the utmost even to meet ordinary demands.

"But every hot day fire hydrants are

water goes to waste down the sewers effectively to flush many miles of streets.
It is hard to stop this practice, because of
the feeling that the water affords a relief

"This habit of young Philadelphia must be centrolled. There is not enough water to go around, and the community must realize that a million gallons used in this unrestricted way means just that much less for systematic flushing of streets in the endeavor to prevent the spread of infantile paralysis or for other useful purposes."

"The police at specified times will open the plugs," Chief Davis continued, "and children can take their baths under the supervision of responsible persons. The plan will be worked out in more detail at an early date. The plan calls for the daily opening of water plugs on playground streets under police supervision." FIREPLUGS DAMAGED BY BOYS

It was explained that under present con-ditions fire hydrants are damaged to a marked extent by boys and irresponsible adults, who open or attempt to open them with wrenches. Many complaints are re-ceived at the Bureau of Water from firemen, who, when responding to alarms, find the plugs damaged and have great difficulty in opening them. "Oftentimes they cannot be opened at all." Chief Davis said. "The danger to the city readily can be

"Furthermore, when hydrants are left "Furthermore, when hydrants are left open boys or other persons seem to take delight in dropping in stones. We even find shoes and articles of all kinds when we clean them. Such a practice must stop. Smaller pipes will answer the same purpose and an arrangement will be made so that fire hydrants can be opened only when needed."

ST. JOHN, LIQUOR FOE, DIES Former Governor of Kansas, Opponent of Blaine, Succumbs

OLATHE, Kan., Sept. 1.—John P. St. John, a candidate for the presidency on the Prohibition ticket in 1884, twice Governor of Kansas and one of the most widely known of Kanssa and one of the most widely known temperance advocates in the United States, is dead here. He was \$3 years old.

He was called a "traitor" when he deserted the Republican party and became a candidate for President on the Prohibition ticket in 1884. During his campaign he was burned or hanged in effigy more than 500 times. He was twice shot at, but unhurt. Many Republicans attributed the defeat of James G. Blains for President to St. John's entrance into the race.

In 1812, notwithstanding his advanced age, he stumped Kansas for woman suffrage, deciaring that when women had the vote they would have prohibition.
When he was in the Kansas Capitol he inaugurated the first "water banquet," with the result that ilquor had been under the ban in the Kansas State House ever since.
