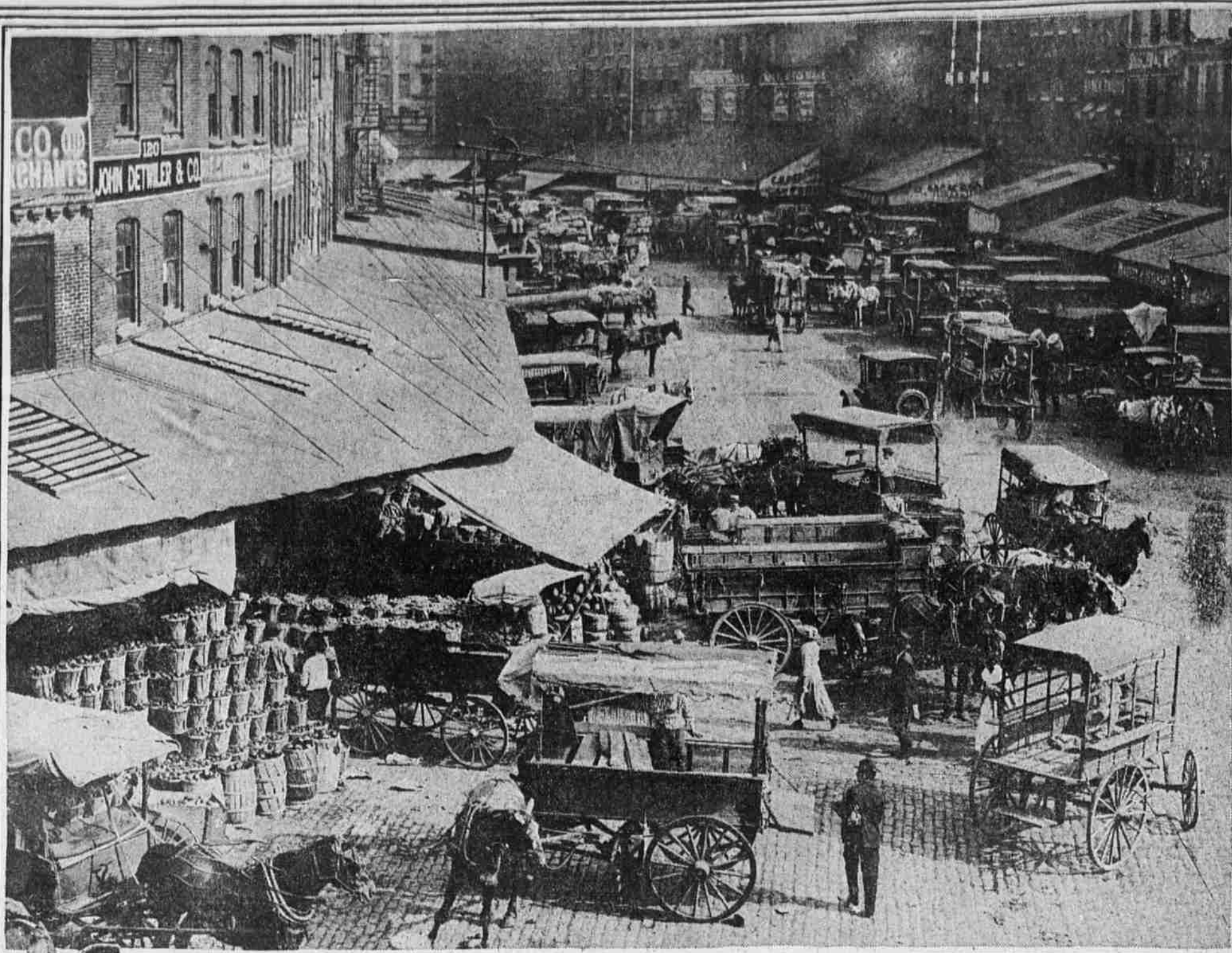




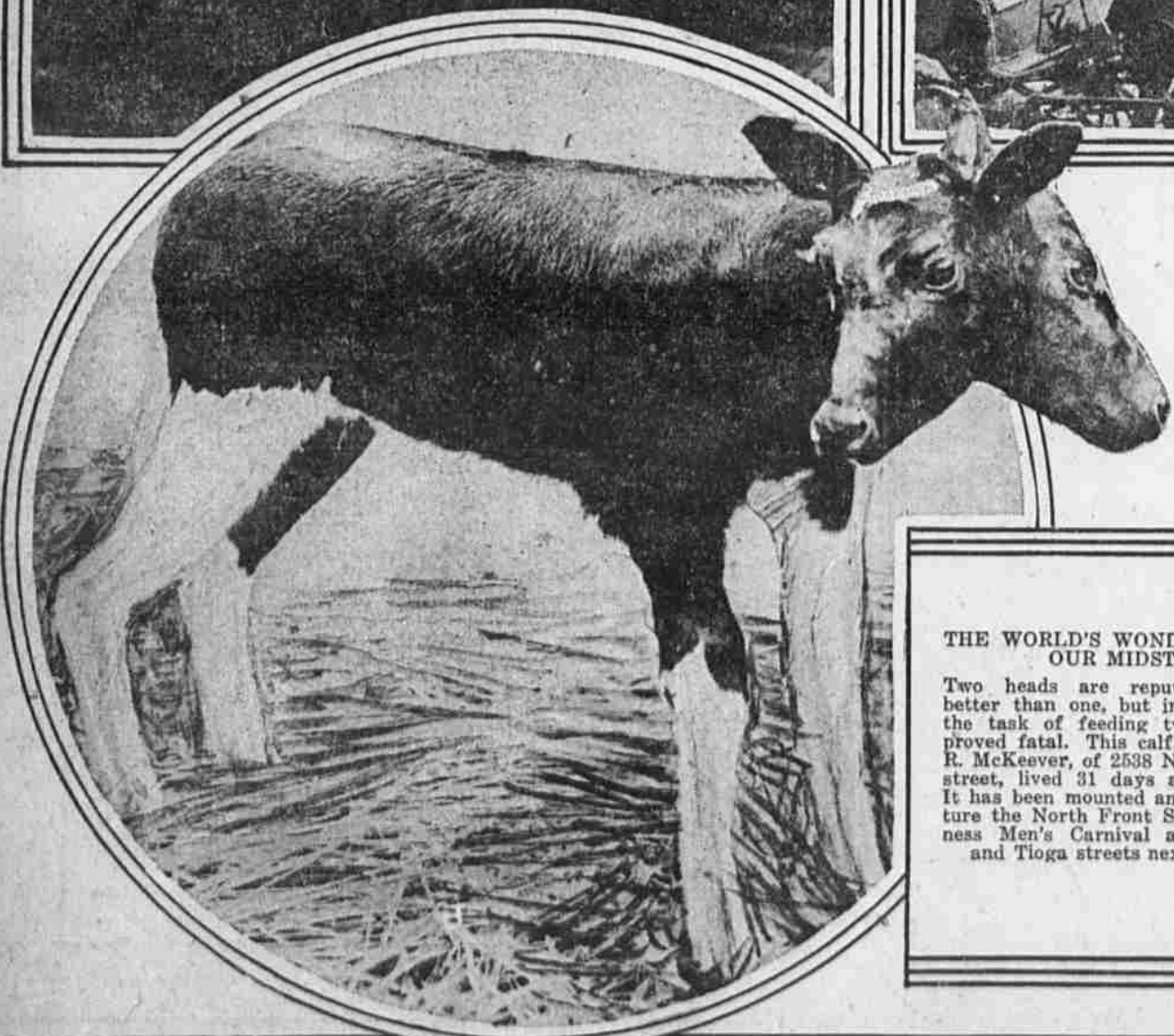
THERE ARE LOTS OF THINGS WE DON'T SEE UNTIL THE CAMERA MAN POINTS THEM OUT

Then there is preserving time here upon us, but Dock street provision merchants are prepared and the Jersey farmers daily ship or bring the products of the "Garden State" across the ferries.



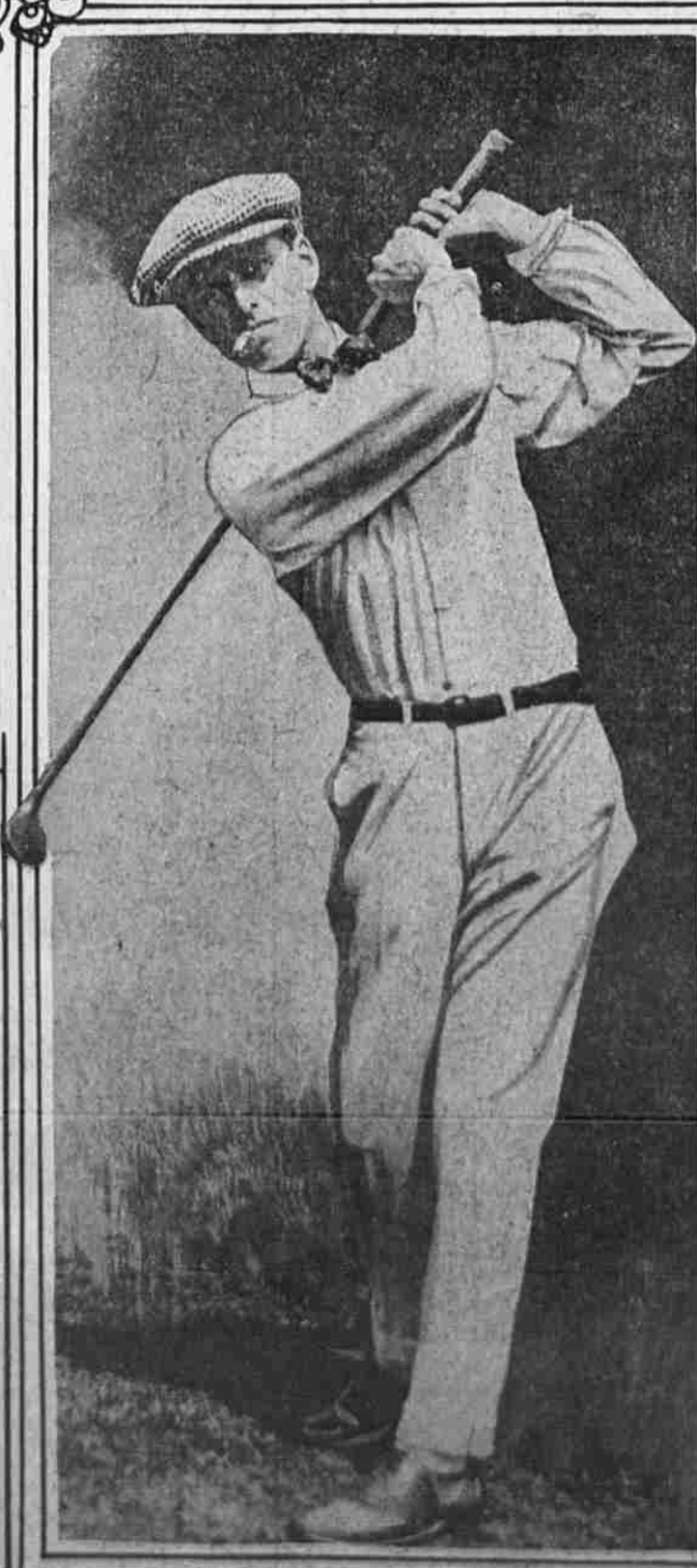
THE WORLD'S WONDER IS IN OUR MIDST
