



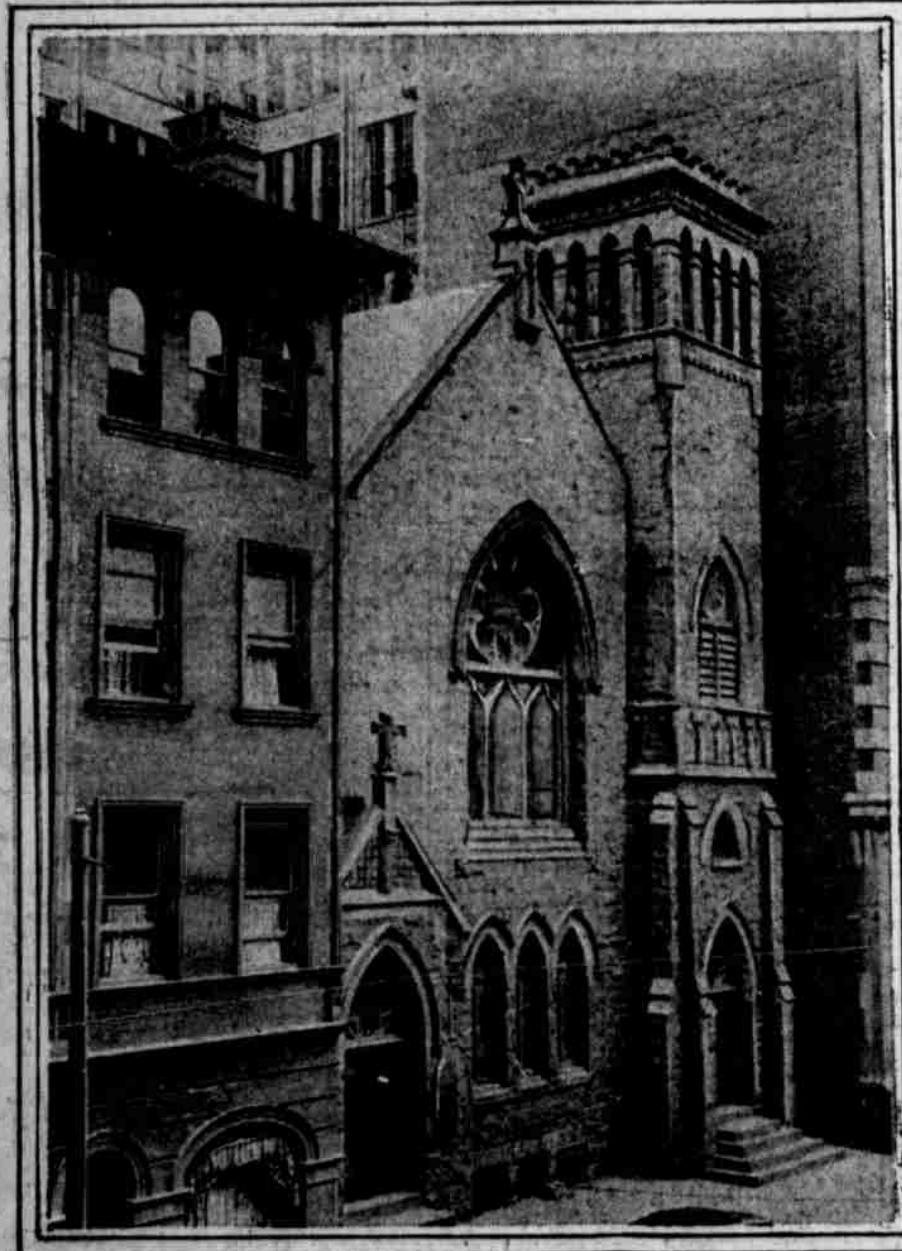

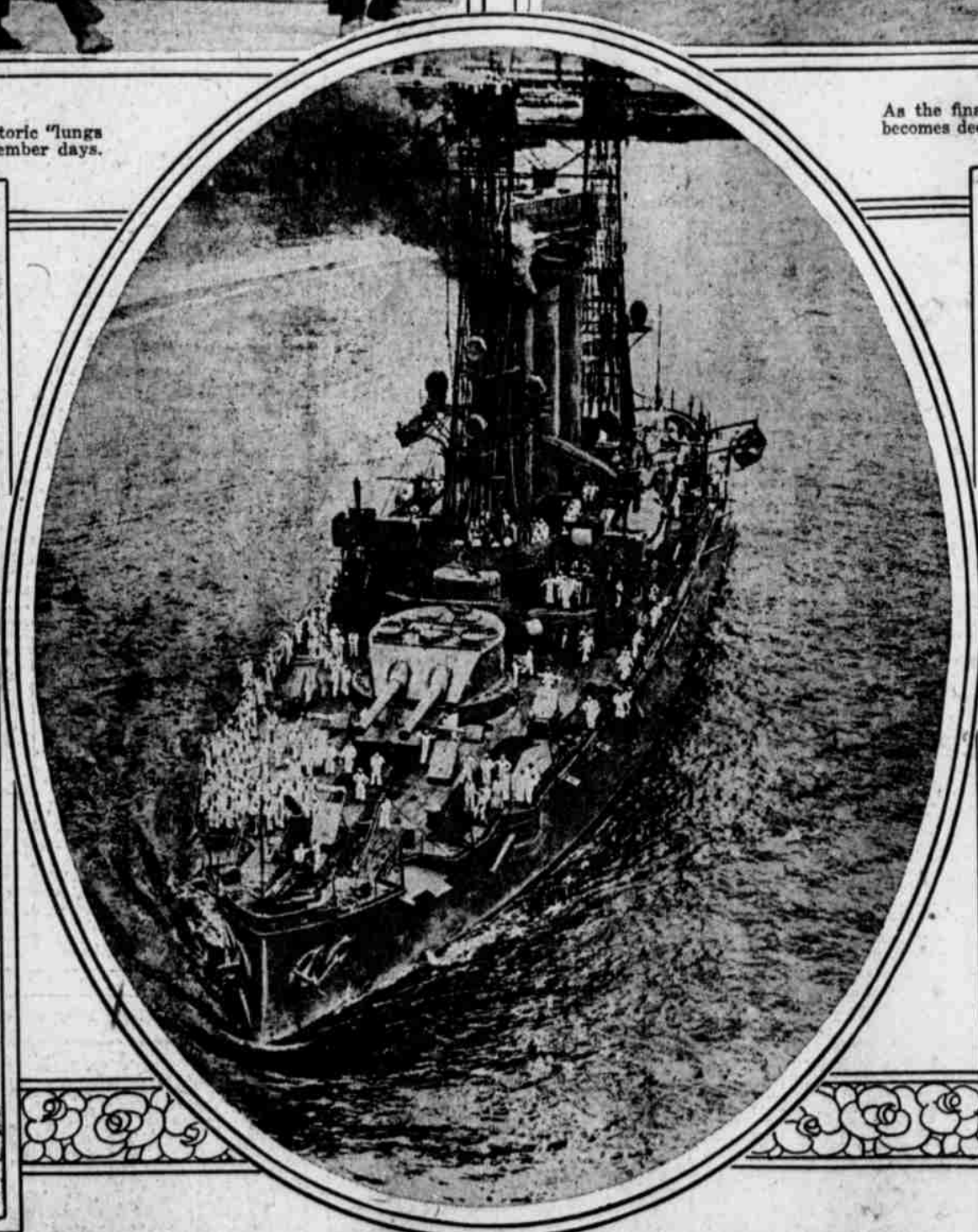
SOMEHOW, WARM BREEZES MISS THIS SPOT
At Sixth and Walnut streets, where the Curtis Building abuts upon two historic "lungs of the city," there is always a breeze even on these sweltering early September days.



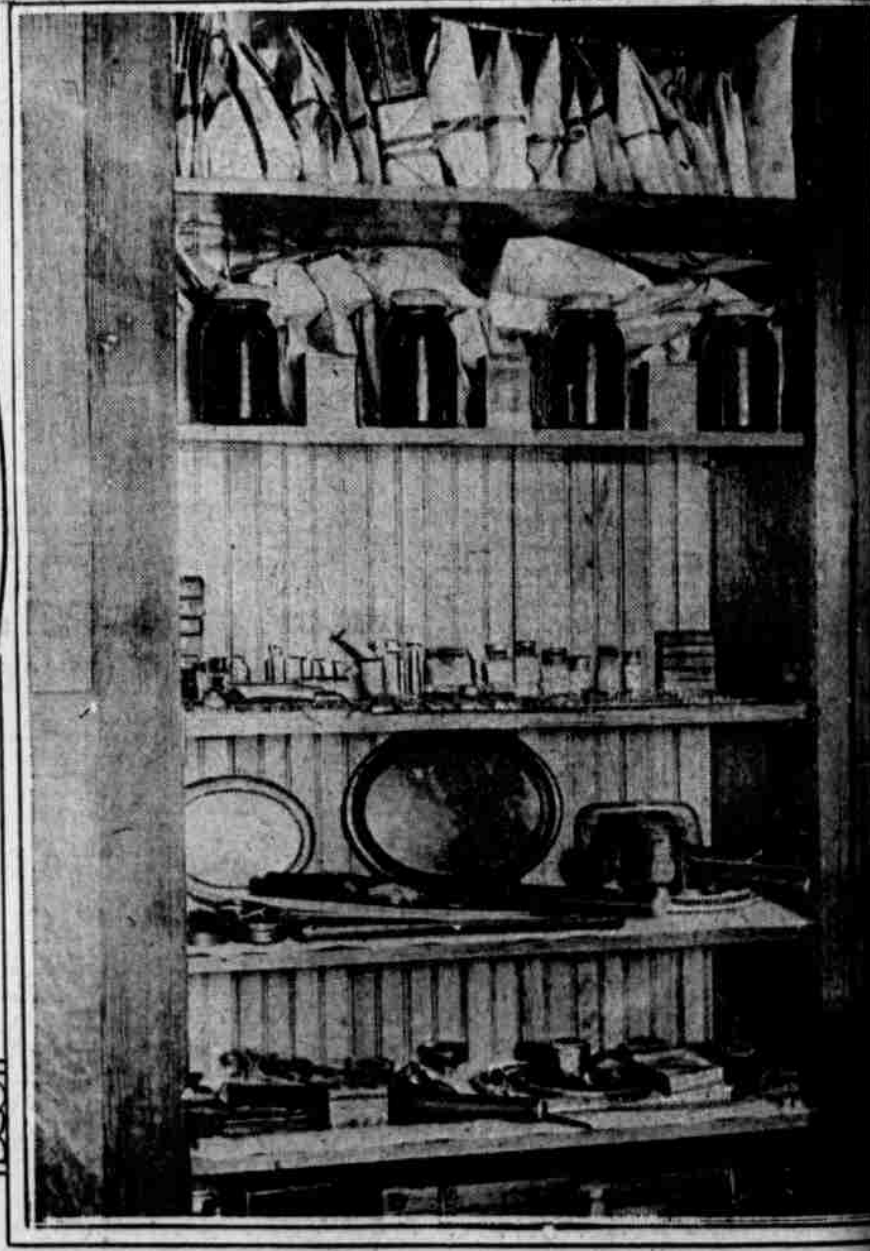
NOT ALL THE GALLERY IS ON THE LINKS
