Many growers are refusing to sell at prevailing prices, 15 cents for wrappers and 4 cents a pound for fillers. A good many crops have been sold for 16 and 5 cents, a few for 17 and 5, and high-water mark was reached when Daniel Shuman, residing two miles from Lancaster, sold to a Philadelphia clgar company for 18, 8 and 2 cents a pound.
