By widening this wedge they will threaten the German positions north and south. Moreover, the Allics are thus brought nearer to the important railroad aunaly line the important railroad supply line between Lille and Peronne, which has been of immense value to the Germans. The map affords a view of the entire fighting line north-

ward to the sea, the shaded area representing the ground gained by the Allies since they opened their drive in July. Serblans are continuing their advance.

RUSSIANS CAPTURE CAUCASUS VILLAGE IN SNOWSTORM; TURKS BEAT BACK FOE NEAR OGNOTT

LONDON, Sept. 13.—Sweeping forward in a snowstorm, the Russian troops in the Caucasus captured yesterday the mountain south of Pirdjani and the heights along the River Masladaraksi. In the Ognoit sector the Turks thrust back the forces of the Grand Duke Nicholas and recaptured their former positions. On the Persian frontier, south of Deobende, the Ottomans were also successful in winning ground.

The Russian official report of today reads:

Caucasus front—Our detachments captured the pyramidical mountain south of the village of Pirdjani and occupied the heights on the left bank of the river Masladaraksi. Snow fell in the mountains and there was froat. The Turkish announcement of September

10 says: Turkish forces pushed back the ensmy and occupied the heights south of Dechende, on the Persian frontier. Caucasus front—In the Ognott sec-tor, on September 8, the enemy at-tacked repeatedly, but was completely repulsed. "Careful examination by the Board of Engineers and our own engineers indicates that the center span of the Quebec bridge was lost through the failure of a casting on a lifting girder on which the span had been resting with a greater load for the last

"The cantilever arms were not injured in any way and preparations are now under way to replace the center span as soon as practicable."


CENTER COUNTY GRANGERS GIVE SUFFRAGE BIG BOOST
