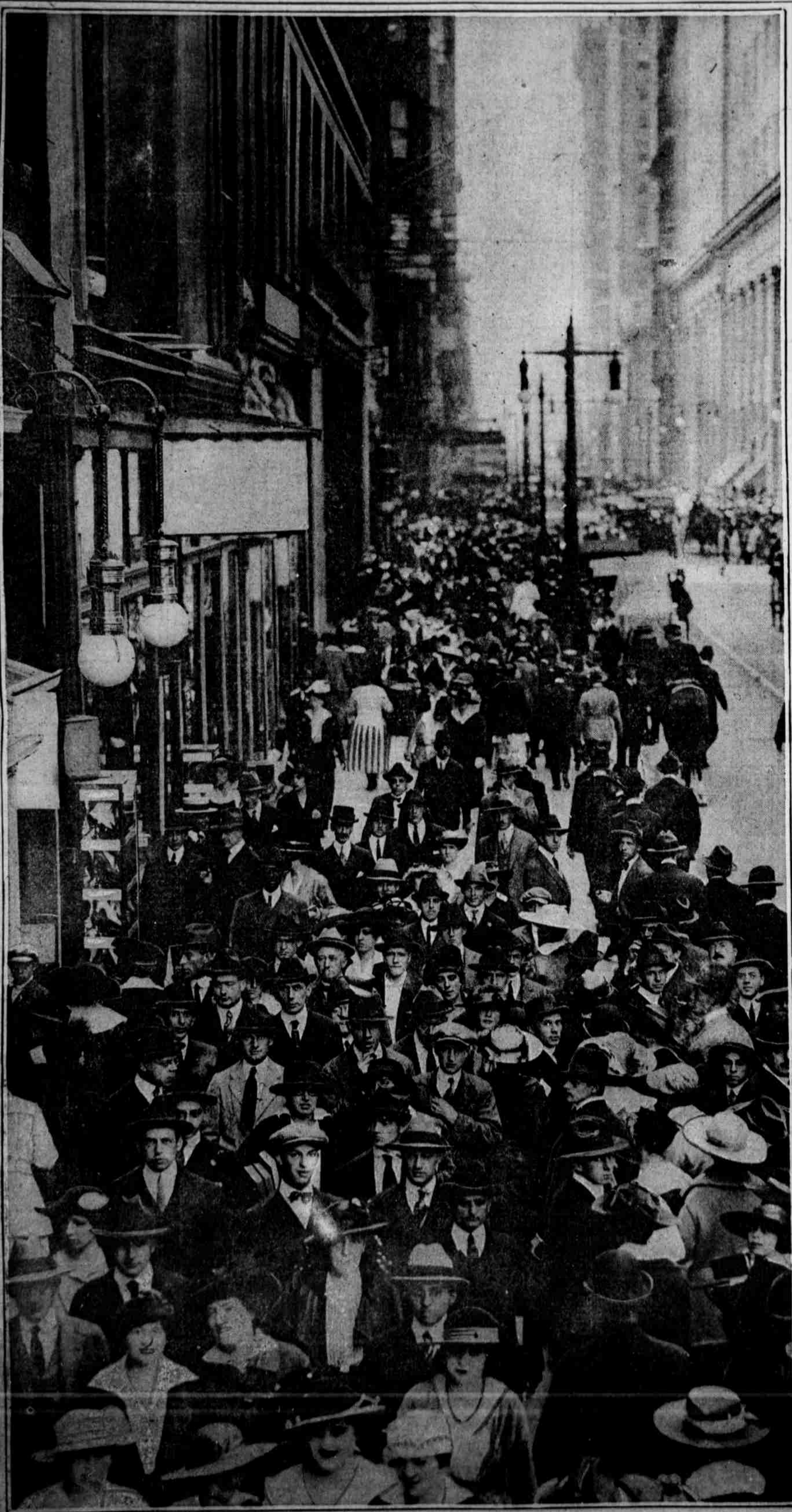

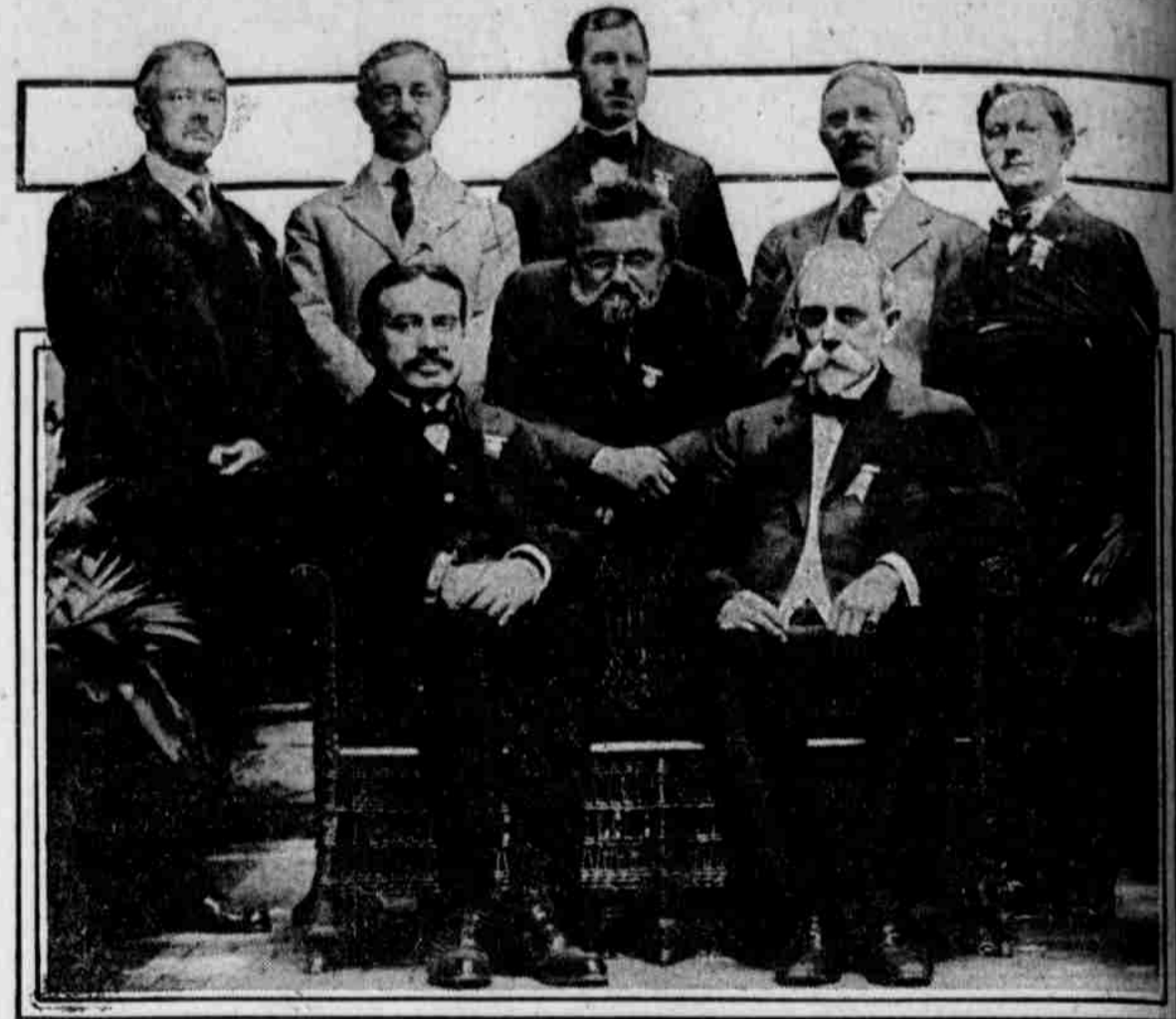

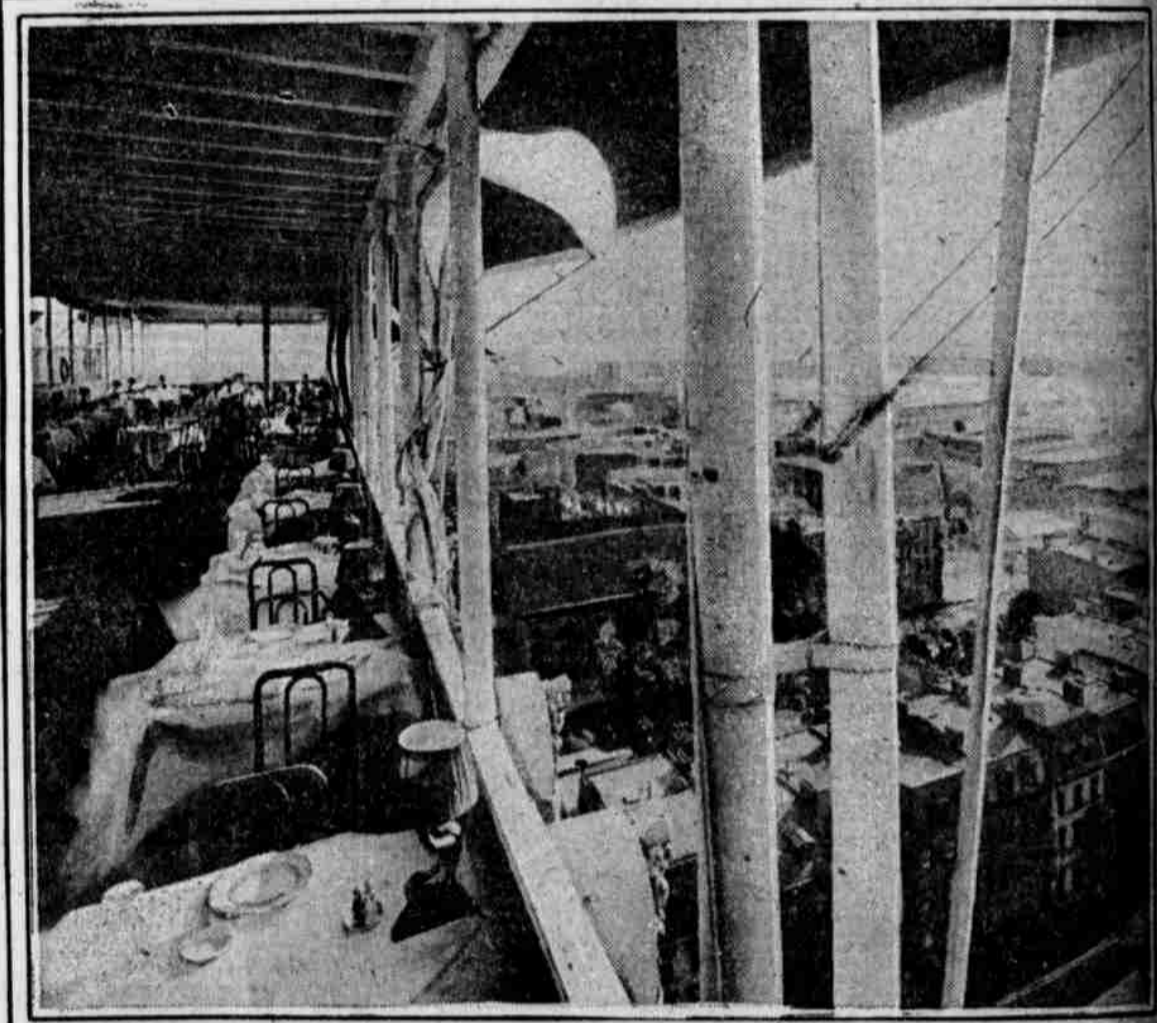

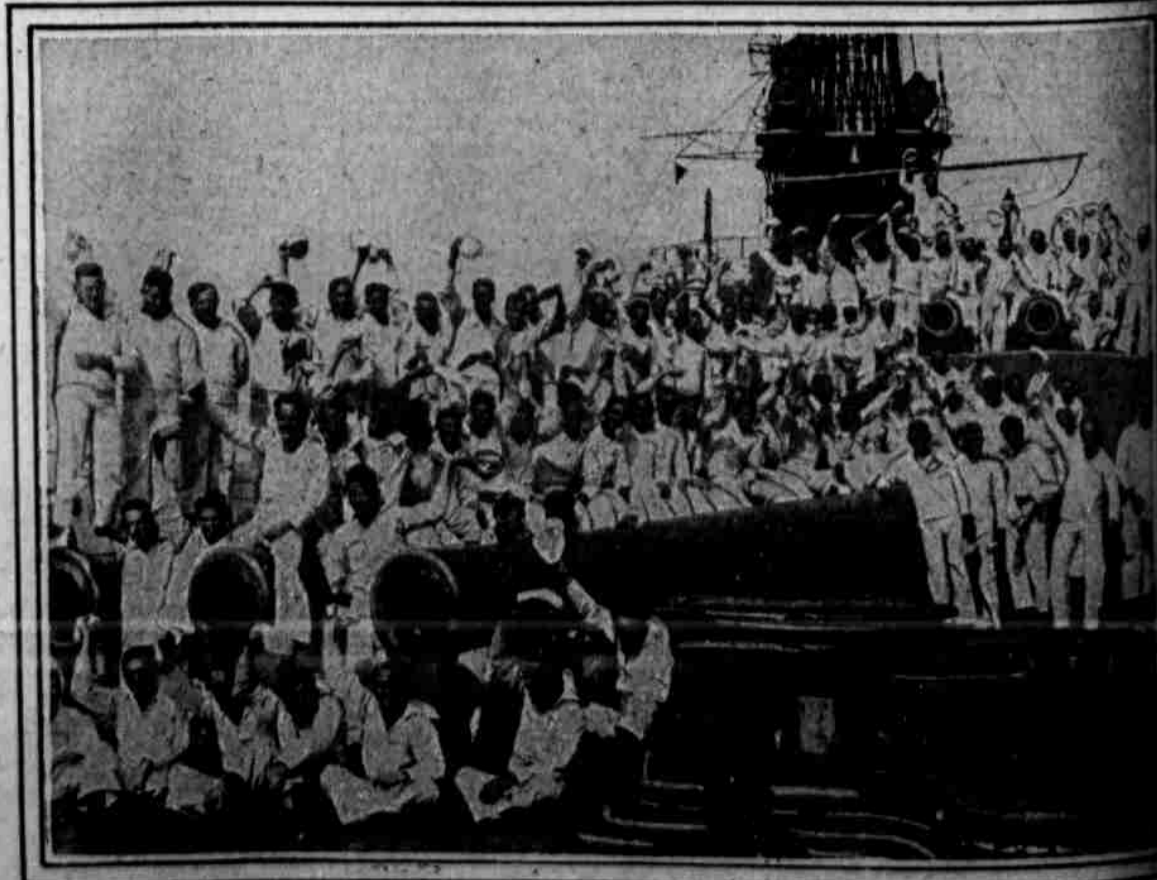

Experiments showed the fire of the middle gun would have to be delayed one-twentieth of a second.
