RIOTING AT ITS WORST IN NEW YORK STRIKE

General Industrial Tie-up Threatens Unles Meeting Thursday Brings Peace

NEW YORK, Sept. 26 -After a night of the worst ricting since the beginning of the present strike of street car men in New York. in which subway, elevated and surface cars were stacked, orders were issued today to the New York police that ricting must be put down at all costs.

The authorities are convinced that the striking men do not intend to abandon their fight for recognition without a most desperate struggle, and arrangements have been made for a more rigid guard than ever for protection of the cars.

Twenty arrests were made today in con-nection with the rioting, and of the men now held fifteen have been charged with commission of a felony. It is the first time since the strike began that any men ar-rested for taking part in violent demon-strations have been booked on this charge.

The apparent failure of negotiations to prevent a general industrial strike if the traction difficulty is not settled by 2 o'clock Friday afternoon has caused added serious-

Notwithstanding the refusal of President Shonts, of the Interborough, to arbitrate Shonts, of the Interborough, to arbitrate with the carmen's union when appealed to by the merchants' committee, efforts to bring about industrial peace have not been abandoned. Another conference of business men, the Mayor, Chairman Straus, of the Public Service Commission, and probably the union leaders has been arranged for Thursday afternoon at City Hall. There is an undeniable feeling, however, that it will accomplish but little.

Despite the outbreak of violence on the part of strike sympathiers, the various transportation systems of the city were in better shape today than they have been since the beginning of the trouble. Subway and elevated trains were running on full schedule and surface cars were moving

After the call important room traders participated on a large scale and by the end of the first ten minutes prices for some five issues had been run up about five points over the early figures.

The early bulge of a point or two above last night's closing figures seemed to attract heavy realizing, while there was more southern selling and senti-ment appeared to be unsettled by reports that a British steamer had been torpedeed on September 6 with two Americans on board.

In the latter part of the forenoon active months were 15 to 16 points net lower, with selling quite active.

The break carried December contracts off to 15.98 and January to 16.07 late in the morning, or about 19 points under last night's closing figures.
