Apparently nothing can down the movies' sidest tradition—a belief that all leading women must be young girls. It came in sith Mary Pickford, and it did not go out with the Gishen, Mae Marsh, Mary Miles dinter, Louise Huff or any of the other aretty little things. It persists in the new-ramous Players release, "The Reward of Patience," by Shannon Fife, featuring Miss Huff, which entertained Stanley audiences reaterday.

Fortunately, Director Robert G. Vignola and Author Fife understand just what young girls can do before the camera, and what they can't. So the result is an attractive photopiay, not too intricate in the plothandling, and butwarked by some fotching rural scenery, with waterfalls and country sward prominent.

Miss Huff, who used to Lubin, acts the part of a Quaker maid daintily. Lettie Pickford brings vivacity to a small role, and there are flashes of celluloid humor that add impetus to the proceedings.
