

CLEVELAND STAR STILL TOPS THE AMERICAN LEAGUE SWATTERS SPEAKER VIRTUALLY CLINCHES BATTING HONORS FOR SEASON; CHASE SUPREME IN NATIONAL

Cleveland Star Leads Cobb by 27 Points With .391 and Reds' Veteran Tops Field by Seven Points with .329

THIS SPEAKER virtually has clinched the batting crown in the American League for 1916, while Hal Chase, of the Cincinnati Reds, gradually is drawing away from the field and now looks like the winner of the National League batting title. Both leaders made seven-point gains, Speaker boosting his mark from .384 to .391 and Chase going from .322 to .329. Horanzy, leader in the Tanager circuit last week, lost four points and dropped to third place, Zack Wheat gaining three and taking second place with a .322.

Strunk and Collins both gained, Amos picking up six points and advancing his mark from .310 to .316, and Collins going from .305 to .314. McInnis added two points, but still has a .347.

In long hits by club the Phillies lead. They are third in club fielding and fourth in batting. Stock is the Phils' best batsman with .392. Luderus is hitting .282 and Whitted .281.
