DATES FOR THE LOCAL OPEN GOLF CHAMPIONSHIP ARE SET OVER TO FOLLOWING WEEK

Time Changed From October 11 as Announced. "Great" Scoring at Sunnybrook

By SANDY MENBLICK The vicissitudes of the Philadelphia open golf championship have finally been settled.

After the setting of many temporary dates postponed from the original scheduled date in August, the event has now been set for the week of October 15.

The date as decided upon and announced yesterday was reconsidered when it was found to conflict with the match play at New York for the championship of the Professional Golfers' Association of the United States.

Those in charge of the local have gotten weary of sidetracking it to make way for other professional tournaments, and it is definitely stated that the date, as above, will stand, no matter how many other tournaments crop in the same week.

More than sixty pros gathered yesterday at Inwood Country Club, New York, in an effort to qualify for the United States professional championship from the metropolitan district.

Twelve qualified and incidentally rolled up parts of \$100 with his pocket padding, said stuffing being offered as prize money.

Walter Hagen, Bob MacDonalld, Gil Nichols, Tom McNamara, MacDonalld Smith and other famous pros were among those present.

Speaking of those coming under the head of professional golfers, it might not be at all amiss to mention the fact that Francis Outmet, former amateur and open champion, is still shooting a 117 golf, despite the fact that he is commonly pictured by his friends as being so weighed down by the sorrows of being barred from amateur competition that he never wants to see a golf club again.

Outmet was sniffing the piny breezes at Bretton Woods, N. H., yesterday, and incidentally swinging a golf club or two. He shot a 66 over the course, very neat, whilst picking pointers along the course.

Needless to say this score is a record, and one which will stand the assaults of time and man. Outmet was tinning the long putts, so the story goes. The young golf hero is evidently still right on his game.

Great Shot Harvest Sunnybrook in Philadelphia's newest golf course. It is not much more than a year old, but already a record has been hung up there.

Two local golfers hung up the grand record between them of 195 strokes for nine holes. A gallery of prominent citizens hurrahed at the thrilling points of the play.

At each hole, proclaimed the victor, hooted the loser and otherwise thoroughly enjoyed the bout this week at what is known as the "Millonaires' Club."

Murdoch Kendrick, well-known lawyer, drew the "roundest" rounds of applause and made the gallery ejaculate the most, for he went the nine holes in the lovely total of 194 strokes.

"I couldn't putt," said the barrierer simply at the end of the round. Kendrick was tackled against Cornelius Haggerty, a Democrat of local political fame, who beat the former to a frazzle when he "only" ran up eighty-seven strokes for the nine holes. Haggerty gave Kendrick a handicap of eighteen strokes, so that he won handily by three strokes.

But he wasn't satisfied. "If I only could have got my driver working," said Haggerty wistfully at the end of the nine holes.

Grudge Match The match was evolved from a lunch-hour wrangle between the grouping at the festive board. Not a few toasts and threats were registered.

William Findlay Brown, Assistant District Attorney, opined that there was nothing to it, and laid his hopes on Kendrick, provided his choice was given a bonus of two strokes per hole.

David Smyth, a former Director of Public Parks, felt the other way about it, so there was plenty of opposition.

Judge "Joe" Patterson consented to act as referee, and the match was on. Other golf at the club was suspended for the day and all the gathering feasted on shots such as were never made before and many which will probably never be seen again.

Joseph C. Le Due, wealthy Chicagoan, who is now in Philadelphia in connection with the local race track, was also present.
