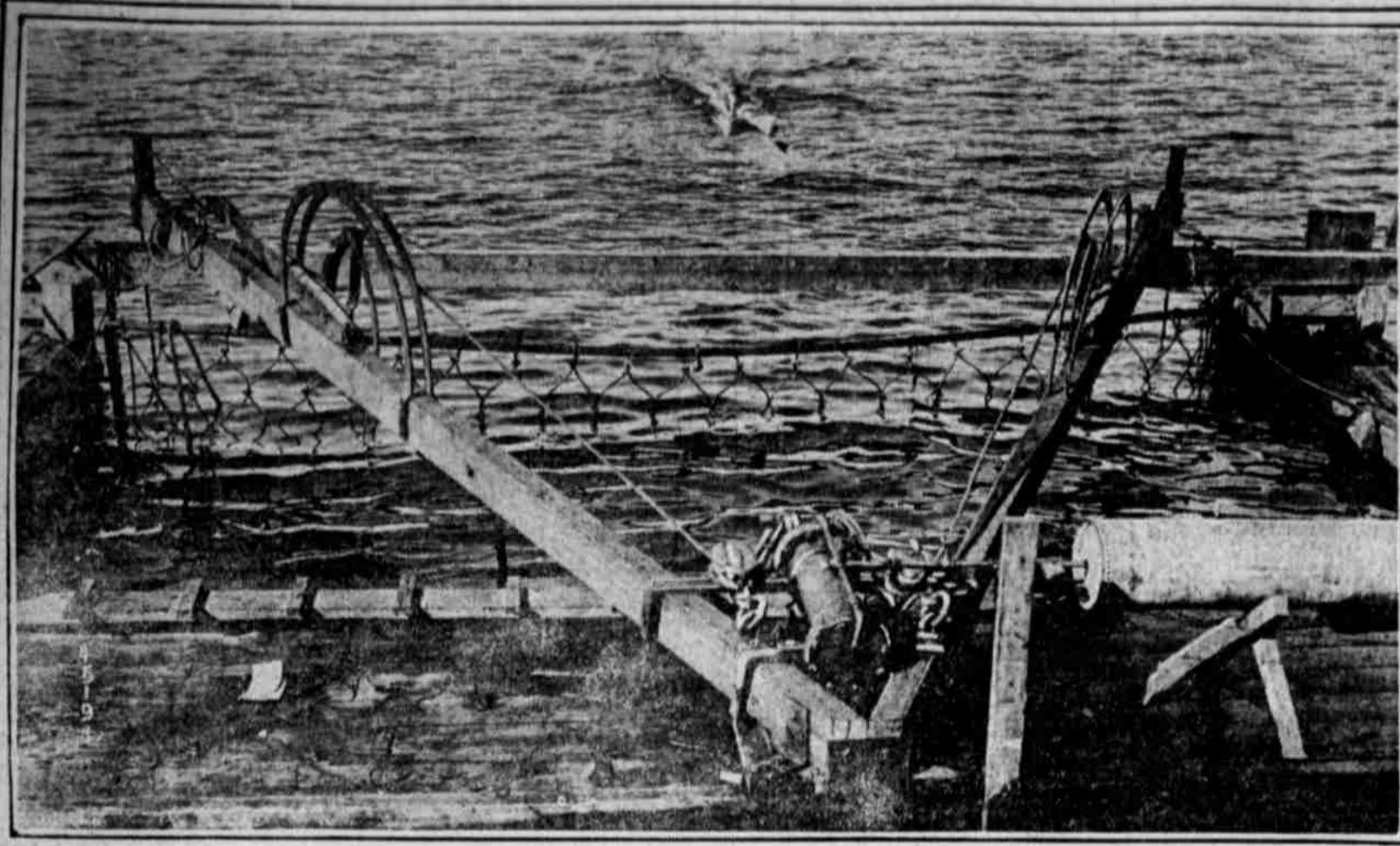




THE PICTORIAL NEWS OF THE DAY RANGES ALL THE WAY FROM TORPEDOES TO GOLDFISH

A MARRIAGE FIFTY YEARS OLD AND ITS FRUITS

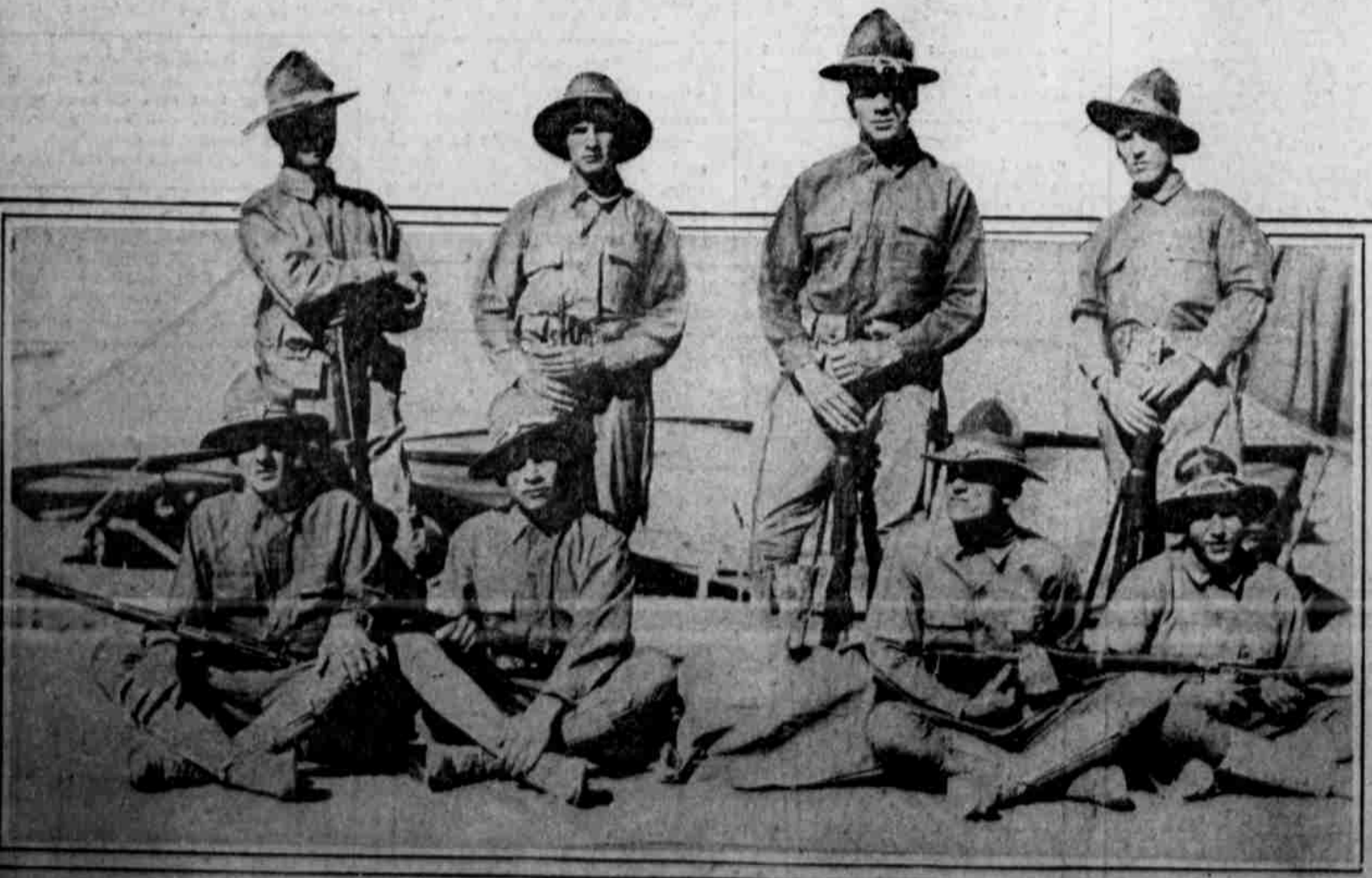
