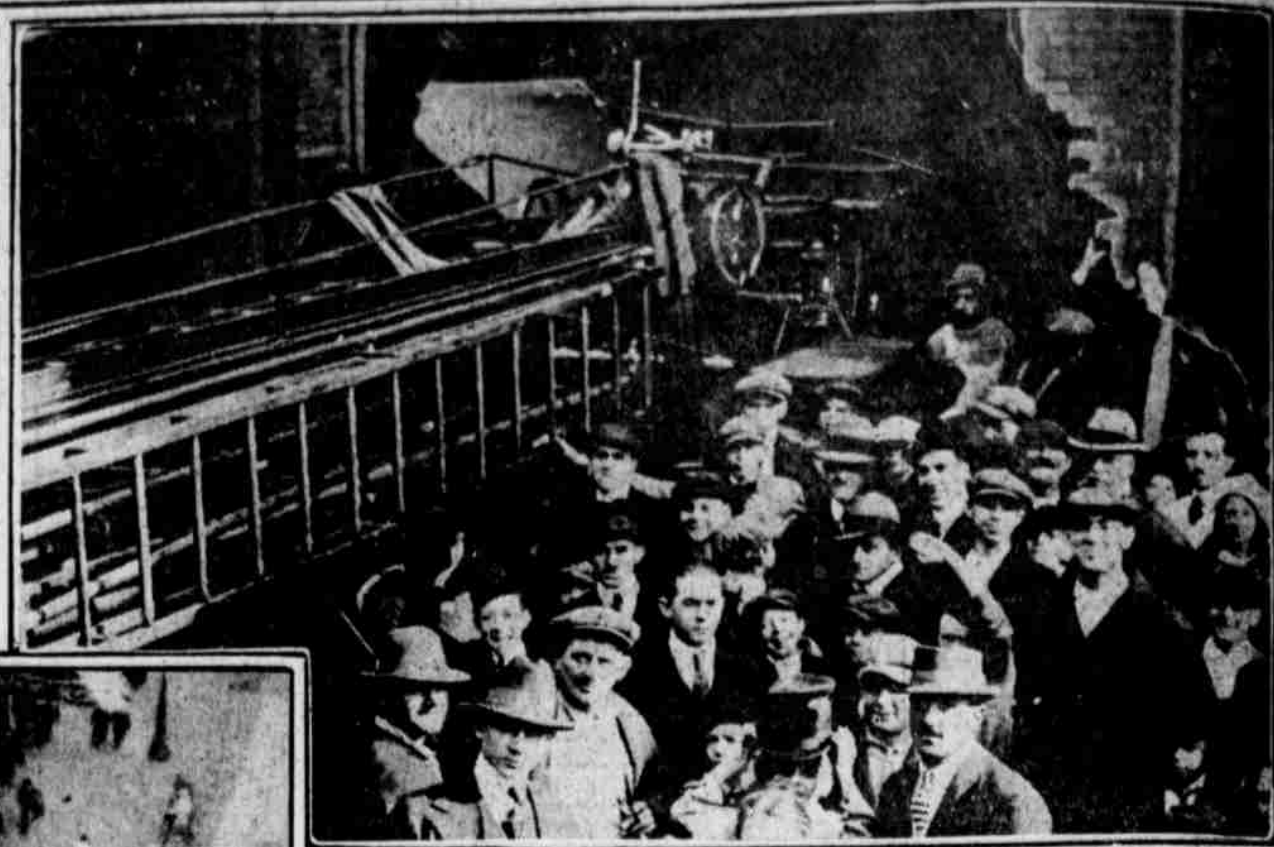




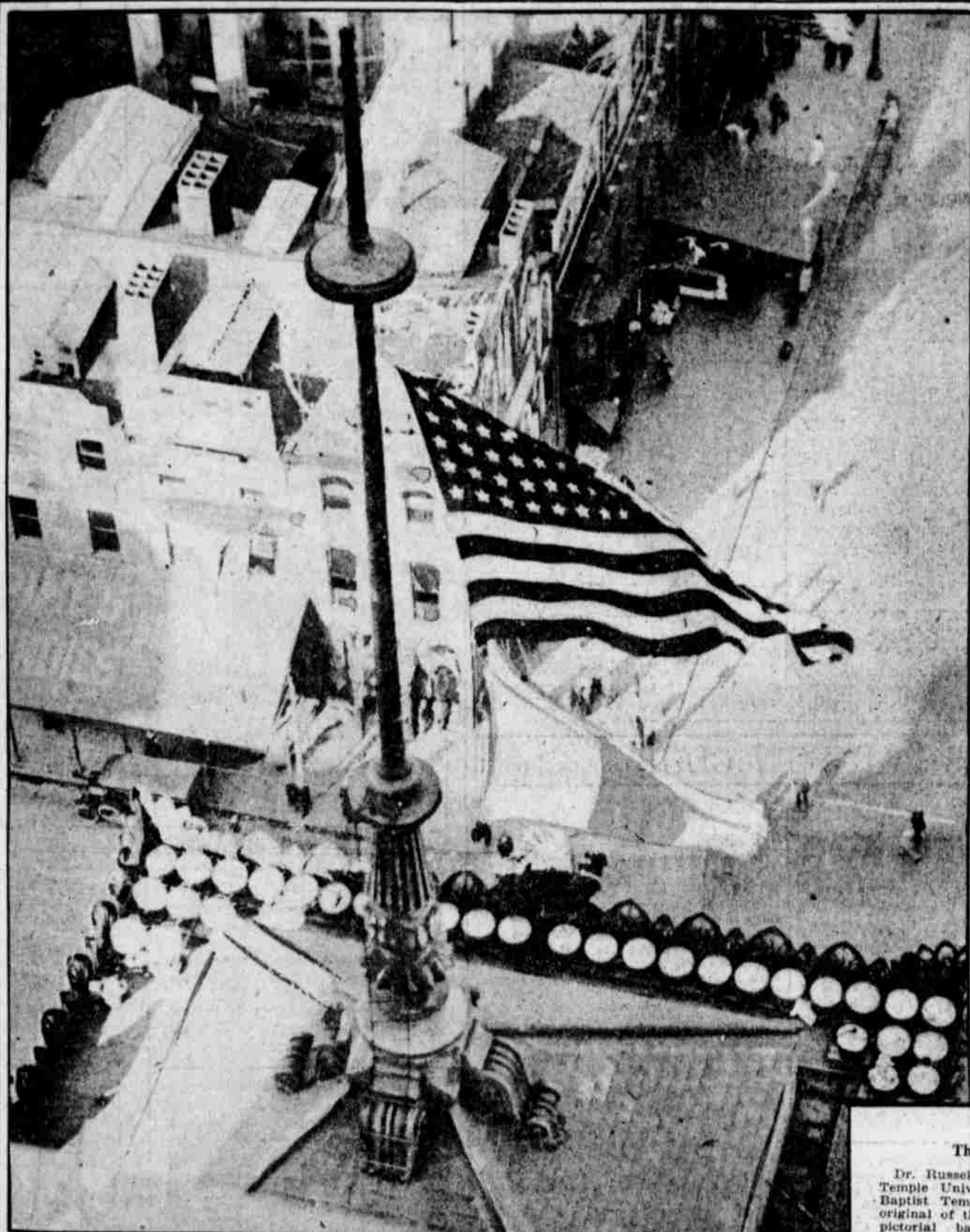
INTERNEED GERMAN SAILORS ENJOYING PHILADELPHIA'S HOSPITALITY

 He has just been appointed by Governor Brumbaugh to serve on a commission to readjust the recording and insuring of titles for real estate.

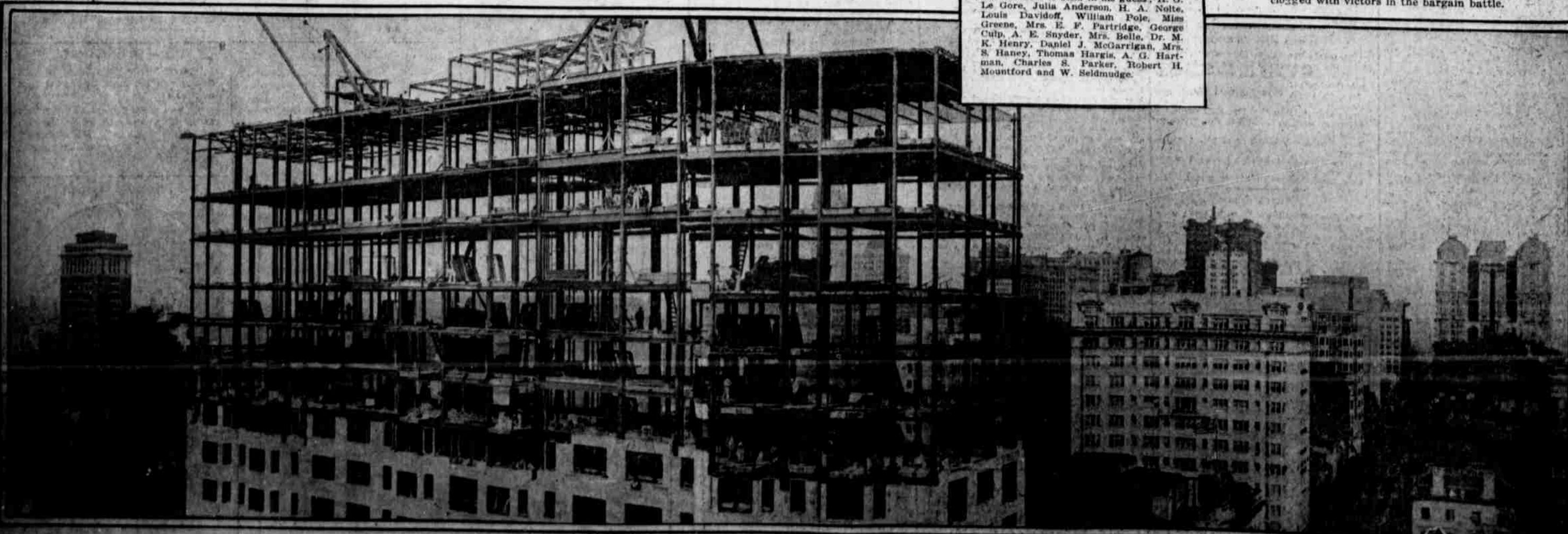


HOW CITY HALL TOWER IS ILLUMINATED
