

# HUGHES WINS PHILADELPHIA BY 102,944

Republicans Carry Every Ward in City Except the Sixth

TAFT-ROOSEVELT VOTE EXCEEDED BY 18,000

Wilson's Poll 89,134, Which Is About 28,000 More Than in 1912

WALLING'S GREAT RUN

The entire Republican ticket, headed by Charles Evans Hughes, swept Philadelphia yesterday by a plurality of 102,944. Hughes carried every ward in the city except the Democratic Sixth, where the late Thomas J. Ryan was leader.

Complete returns showed that Hughes received 132,078 votes and President Wilson 89,134.

The Republican presidential candidate polled a vote here that was greater than the combined Taft and Roosevelt vote in 1912. Taft and Roosevelt polled 174,937 votes, while Wilson received 66,306 four years ago.

The President ran approximately 10,000 votes ahead of the Democratic State ticket in this city. Thomas Rose, of Philadelphia, candidate for Congressman-at-large, was the only State Democratic candidate whose vote equaled that given the President. He received a total of 89,922.

Justice Emory A. Walling carried the city by a majority of 142,785 on the non-partisan ticket for Justice of the Supreme Court. His majority was the largest given any candidate here. Justice Walling received 180,331 votes, as against 37,546 for Charles Palmer, his opponent.

Phlander C. Knox, for United States Senator, carried Philadelphia by 21,489. The Republican nominee received 191,071 votes, as against 79,602 for Ellis L. Orvis, Democrat.

Congressman Peter E. Costello, Republican candidate for re-election to Congress in the 5th district, and Congressman George F. Darrow, Republican candidate for re-election in the 6th district, each received substantial majorities. David Martin also had little trouble defeating State Senator Richard V. Farley for the State Senate in the 5th senatorial district. Costello received a total of 28,716 votes to 16,996 for Donoho, a majority of 11,720. Darrow's vote was 41,712, as against 24,597 for Logue, giving Darrow a majority of 20,115. Martin, with the support of both factions of the Republican Organization, received 20,452, while Farley polled only 8618. Martin's majority was 11,834.

The vote for the other congressional candidates was as follows: 1st District, W. S. Vane, Rep., 23,142; Lawrence E. McCrossin, Dem., 12,206. Second District, George S. Graham, Rep., 23,833; Thomas E. Shea, Dem., 7081. Third District, J. Hampton Moore, Rep., 23,797; Joseph Hagerty, Dem., 7762. Fourth District, George W. Edwards, Rep., 25,435; Patrick H. Lynch, Dem., 11,225.

The vote for the other three State Senators was as follows: 1st dist., Edwin H. Vane, Rep., 23,740; Richard T. McSorley, Dem., 10,679; 2d district, James P. McCreel, Rep., 18,484; James P. Cumminskey, Jr., Dem., 4474; 7th district, Augustus F. Dair, Jr., Rep., 23,754; Elmer W. Nittinger, Dem., 10,433.

Harmon M. Kephart, for State Treasurer, and Charles A. Snyder, for Auditor General, received overwhelming majorities over their Democratic opponents. Kephart's vote here was 167,479, as against 89,522 for James M. Cramer, Democrat. Snyder's majority was 108,957. The vote for Snyder was 191,570, a majority of 116,957 over James B. Murrin, who polled 74,617 votes.

John R. K. Scott polled the highest vote cast in Philadelphia. He received 122,579 for re-election as Congressman-at-large. The vote given the other Republican candidates for Congressman-at-large was as follows: Thomas S. Crapo, 190,251; Mahlon M. Garland, 190,041; Joseph McLaughlin, 174,795. McLaughlin was knifed to some extent in South Philadelphia in favor of Thomas Rose, Democratic candidate. Rose received 89,822 votes. The vote of the other Democratic candidates was: Joseph T. Kinsey, 71,480; John J. Moore, 70,385; Jacob B. Waldich, 75,028.

The Republican ticket, for State Representatives was elected without much trouble.

## NEBRASKA FOR WILSON, PROHIBITION TRIUMPHS

Democratic Majority Is Fully 15,000 in the State—"Dry" Amendment Wins

OMAHA, Neb., Nov. 8.—With the State's vote still incomplete indications were that Wilson had carried Nebraska by about 15,000 and that Hitchcock, Dem., for United States Senator, is elected by from 10,000 to 12,000. Neville, Dem., for Governor, is running behind, but may be elected over Sutton, Rep. Neville and Hitchcock were both opposed by William J. Bryan.

Prohibition has possibly carried by 20,000. Lobeck, Dem., for Congress, has been re-elected in the Omaha district, but other districts have not reported.

Democratic leaders claim Nebraska for Wilson by a majority of 15,000. Seventy-two precincts out of 1789 give Wilson 9754 and Hughes 1258. Republican leaders have not conceded the State to Wilson.

The prohibitory amendment, belated returns from the State indicate. One hundred precincts have given the amendment a majority of 6009, with "dry" territory unheard from. The Omaha World-Herald declared the amendment carried by a majority of 10,000.

Senator Gilbert M. Hitchcock, Democratic candidate for re-election, claims victory over John L. Kennedy, his Republican opponent, by 10,000 majority. Twenty precincts give Hitchcock 2729 and Kennedy 2397.

## SOUTH DAKOTA GOES FOR HUGHES BY 12,000

State Vote Grants Franchise to Women and Adopts Prohibition Amendment

SIOUX FALLS, S. D., Nov. 8.—South Dakota gave its electoral votes to Charles E. Hughes, adopted Statewide prohibition, gave women the franchise, elected two and possibly three Republican Congressmen and a full Republican State ticket.

With one-third of the precincts of the State reported, the indications based on the ratio of the territory reported, were that Hughes has won by not less than 12,000 plurality. Peter Nordeck, Republican candidate for Governor, will have more than 25,000 majority.

Prohibition has been adopted by probably 25,000, and equal suffrage by 10,000.

**Robert Hedges After Kansas City?** KANSAS CITY, Mo., Nov. 8.—Robert L. Hedges, former owner of the St. Louis Browns, may get back into baseball. He is reported to be in the market for the franchise of the A. A. Kenesaw, owner of the Kansas City American Association team, for the purchase of the A. A. club. One of the stories in connection with the sale is that Tom Chivington, retiring president of the American Association, will manage Kansas City next year.

**Ballin to Aid Lafayettees Against Lehigh** EASTON, Pa., Nov. 8.—The athletic committee at Lafayette College has made arrangements to re-enforce the coaching staff during the week which precedes the game with Lehigh. Harold Ballin, who has been coaching the Princeton guards this season, will report at March Field on the day after the Princeton-Yale game, and will assist with the coaching throughout that week. Ballin was line coach at Lafayette last year. He attained great success and won wide popularity among the football players and the college at large.

Chicago gives Wilson 482,808 and Hughes 287,115, a lead of 195,693 for Hughes.

Medlin McCormick, Republican candidate for Congressman-at-large, is piling up a tremendous vote. In scattering precincts he is polling more votes than Lowden.

Fred E. Sterling, Republican State chairman, issued this claim: "Indications are that both Hughes and Lowden will carry Illinois by more than 200,000. Heavy gains are being made in many Democratic counties. For instance, La Salle County was figured on for 3000, and it cast 8000 for Hughes."

A switch of a large part of Socialist vote to Wilson is indicated by the early returns. It bears out reports current for weeks that the Socialists would split for Wilson on account of his "human justice" record. There is a marked falling off in the straight Socialist vote. Debs got 81,237 in Illinois in 1912. Incomplete returns indicate that Benson today got 40,000 votes or less.

## REPUBLICANS PILE UP HUGE VOTE IN ILLINOIS

Plurality of 200,000 Indicated by Returns From Chicago and Down-State

CHICAGO, Nov. 8.—Down-state figures received early today indicated that the sweeping victory of Charles E. Hughes was even greater than at first reported and that his plurality may exceed 200,000.

Cook County, virtually complete, indicated Wilson got 143,050 women's votes and Hughes 148,000. Hughes probably will get a plurality down State from the women of close to 100,000. Socialist and Prohibition candidates received about four per cent of the feminine vote, incomplete returns indicate.

Cook County returns from 1875 precincts out of 2400 give Hughes, men, 162,398; women, 97,563; Wilson, men, 153,341; women, 93,980.

Down-State returns from 751 out of 2878 precincts give Hughes, men, 104,397; women, 71,402; Wilson, men, 74,836; women, 52,690.
