

**WILSON BEATEN
IN OWN STATE BY
CLOSE TO 40,000**

**Frelinghuysen Defeats Sen-
ator Martine for
Re-election**

EDGE MADE GOVERNOR

Vote for fourteen presidential electors twice
Congressman United States Senator and
Governor. Wilson, 172,336; Hughes, 132,336.
Total, 304,672. Vote 1908—Wilson, 261,326; Dem.,
143,346.

TRIDENTON, N. J., Nov. 8.—The Republi-
cans swept New Jersey, Wilson's home
State, in the election yesterday by a vote
of nearly 40,000. Hughes, who was
elected for President, leading, and electing
Senator Walter E. Edge, Republican, of
Atlantic County, over H. Otto Wittmann,
Democrat, of Hudson, Governor. Former
Senator Joseph R. Frelinghuysen, Republi-
can, of Somerset, over United States Sen-
ator James E. Martine, Democrat, of Union,
United States Senator, and a Republican
Legislature.

In this, the 4th Congressional District,
Congressman E. C. Hutchinson, Republican,
of this city, won from A. M. Beekman,
Democrat, of Somerset, for Congress, by
only about 900.

Republican State headquarters this
morning claimed New Jersey for that party
by 35,000 to 45,000. The Democratic State
headquarters, on West State street, closed
early, and no statement was forthcoming.

The Senate will be Republican by 20
to 15, and the House Republican by about
20 to 40, giving the Republicans a majority
on joint ballot of 29, which will insure the
election of a Republican to succeed State
Comptroller Edward L. Edwards.

Eighty and possibly nine, Congressmen
have been elected by the Republicans. The
Republicans have in all likelihood carried
the 1st, 2d, 4th, 5th, 7th, 8th, 9th and 10th
districts, while the Democrats probably
captured the 3d, 6th, 11th and 12th. The
8th may not remain in the Democratic
column.

GERMAN VOTE EVIDENT

Hudson County, the Democratic bulwark,
gave only 18,000 for Wittmann, although
the Democrats had been predicting a
election that it would give from 25,000 to
30,000 for the Democratic candidate for
Governor. In 1912 Hudson gave Freider
a plurality of 45,000 over the Republican
for Governor. This slump in the Demo-
cratic vote in Hudson is put down general-
ly to the German vote, which is believed to
have gone largely to the Republicans.

Essex gave about 15,000 to the Republi-
can ticket, electing Osborne, Republican,
to the State Senate, and a Republican as-
sembly's delegate at large.

Monmouth County, where Shadow Lawn,
President Wilson's summer home, is located,
gave only a slight plurality for him.

Frelinghuysen, Republican, for United
States Senator, defeated Martine, Demo-
crat, the incumbent, and sharing the
honors with Governor-elect Edge.

Democratic State Chairman Greenup
early this morning said he had nothing to
say as to the result in New Jersey. He
had a long conversation with Secretary Jo-
seph P. Tumulty, at Shadow Lawn, over the
telephone.

PROGRESSIVES RESPONSIBLE

The abnormal vote for the Republican
Party indicates that the Progressives re-
turned almost an name to the Republican
fold, as the vote for Hughes is calculated to
be close to the combined vote four years
ago for Taft and Roosevelt.

In the 1st congressional district, William
J. Browning, Republican, won from Willard
F. Cattell, Democrat, for Congress; in the
2d, Isaac Bacharach, Republican, defeated
William Meyer, Democrat; in the 3d,
Thomas F. Scully, Democrat, won from
Robert Carson, Republican; in the 4th, E. C.
Hutchinson, Republican, defeated A. M.
Beekman by a close vote; in the 5th, John
H. Capetick, Republican, has been re-elected,
defeating William E. Tatle.

In the 6th District Robert N. Heath,
Dem., has in all probability won over Gus
L. Fike, Rep., by a close vote. In the
7th the Republicans re-elected Dow W.
Drucker over Thomas J. Beardmore. In
the 8th Congressman R. Wayne Parker,
Rep., defeated John A. Matthews, Dem.
In the 10th District Frederick R. Leh-
bach, Rep., was re-elected over Dallas
Flanagan, Dem.; in the 11th John J.
Eagan, Dem., defeated E. C. Brennan, Rep.,
and in the 12th Congressman John A. Ham-
mel, Dem., has been re-elected over Arthur
T. Dear.

H. Otto Wittmann, of Jersey City, wired
Colonel Edge, his successful opponent for
Governor, as follows:

"Congratulations and my best wishes for
a successful administration."
Edge replied: "Many thanks for your
cordial telegram and good wishes."
Governor-elect Edge has made this state-
ment:

"I am, of course, more than gratified with
the emphatic result which was made pos-
sible only by the support of an army of
friends and well-wishers. It is particularly

MAYS LANDING, N. J., Nov. 8.—With
only ten districts to hear from Atlantic
County returns a plurality for Hughes and
Fairbanks of more than 8000; Edge, for
Governor, about 5500; Frelinghuysen, for
United States Senator, 5800; Bacharach,
for Congress, 5200; Richards, for State
Senator, 2800; Whitman and Parsons, for
Assembly, 5450. Republicans swept the
county for all municipal offices.

BURLINGTON

MOUNT HOLLY, N. J., Nov. 8.—Bur-
lington County returns indicate pluralities
as follows: Hughes, 2500; Frelinghuysen,
3000; Edge, 2250; Bacharach, 2700.

CAPE MAY

CAPE MAY, Nov. 8.—Cape May County
gives Hughes a plurality of 44; Freling-
huysen, for United States Senator, 1005;
Edge, for Governor, 1058; Bacharach, for
Congress, 1114; Robert S. Miller, Rep., was
elected Sheriff. Corvillie E. Stille, Rep.,
was re-elected to the Assembly.

CUMBERLAND

BRIDGETON, N. J., Nov. 8.—Estimates
of the Republican pluralities in Cumber-

NEW BRUNSWICK, N. J., Nov. 8.—Mid-
dlesex County gave these pluralities: For
President, Hughes, 1700; United States Sen-
ator, Frelinghuysen, Republican, 2100; Con-
gress, Scully, Democrat, 480. The Republi-
cans elected all the Assemblymen.

OCEAN

TOMS RIVER, N. J., Nov. 8.—Hughes
will have 1000 majority in Ocean County,
Frelinghuysen 800, Edge 700, Parsons, Rep.
for Congress 700. Conrad, Rep., elected to
the State Senate, and Higgen, Rep., to
the Assembly.

PASSAIC

PASSAIC, N. J., Nov. 8.—Although
Hughes did not run with his ticket in
Passaic county, his estimated plurality is
close to 5000. The plurality of Joseph F.
Frelinghuysen, Republican candidate for
United States Senator, is between 85,000 and
70,000, while Dow H. Drukker, the present
Representative in Congress from the 7th
district, won by a trifle more than 1200.
The five Republican candidates for members
of the Assembly won by pluralities of 6200,
John J. Slater, four times county clerk, was
re-elected, running ahead of his ticket. His
estimated plurality is between 7500 and
8000. The Egan good road bill was carried
in Passaic.

SALEM

PENNSBORO, N. J., Nov. 8.—Republi-
cans are confident that they have carried
Salem County and they are only waiting to
see how large a majority they have piled
up. Republican leaders figure that it will
reach 1200 for the entire county. Assem-
blyman Greenwood, of Elmer, has been re-
elected.

In the Pennsboro election for borough
offices stickers played a big part in the
voting because of many vacancies left upon
the tickets at the primaries, when interest
was lax.

SUSSEX

TRENTON, Nov. 8.—The first district to
be heard from in Sussex County gave
Hughes 26 and Wilson 28. There are 28
districts in Sussex County.
County pluralities until early today
were: Atlantic, 4500 R.; Camden, 5000
R.; Cumberland, 1000 R.; Gloucester, 1800
R.; Salem, 500 R.; Monmouth, 2200 D.

UNION

ELIZABETH, N. J., Nov. 8.—Seventy-
nine districts out of 104 in Union County
gave Hughes 374 plurality and Edge, 3321.
United States Senator Martine was defeated
in his home county by Joseph S. Freling-
huysen by about 2800. The Martine vote
was a decided disappointment to the Demo-
crats, the Senator falling even to carry his
home city, Plainfield. The large Republican

pluralities re-elected Congressman
Capetick, of the 5th Congressional District,
in virtually every precinct. His opponent,
former Congressman William E. Tuttle, Jr.,
ran ahead of his Democratic colleague.
Congressman Capetick's plurality in Union
County will be about 1000. The German-
American vote was virtually solid for
Hughes and Frelinghuysen. The present
members of the State Assembly, William
V. Runyon, of Plainfield; Charles Morgan,
of Elizabeth; and John F. Pierson, of West-
field, Republicans, were re-elected by ma-
jorities ranging from 4000 to 5000.

WARREN

BELVIDERE, Nov. 8.—Warren County
has gone Democratic by a majority ranging
from 1800 to 2000. Wilson has a plurality
estimated at 1800.

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
