These figures are based upon the ap-trent success of Sanator Gilbert M. Hitch ck in Nebraska, where at first he seemed cock in Nebraska, where at first he seemed to have been defeated; A. A. Jones, former Assistant Secretary of the Interior, in New Mexico; J. B. Kendrick, Dem., in Wyoming, and Senator Atlee Pomerene in Ohio. Up until early today the returns available in-dicated that, all four had been defeated by Republicans.

DEMOCRATS HOLD SENATE

Of the thirty-five United States Senators of the thirty-five United States Senators slected Tuesday, seventeen are Democrats and eighteen Republicans, which with thirty-seven Democratic and twenty-four Republican hold-overs give the Democrats a majority of twelve in the next Senate. The present Senate consists of fifty-five Democrats and thirty-nine Republicans.

A recapitulation of the Senate situation in latest returns shows the Democrats lost on latest returns shows the Democrats lost six seats, one each in Maine, New York, New Jersey and Maryland and two from Indiana, and that they gained one each in Rhode Island, Delaware, and Utah.

McCOMBS BADLY BEATEN The biggest surprises of the senatorial contest were the defeat of Senator Lippitt for re-ejection by Peter G. Gerry, Democrat, which was due to the latter's receiving the united support of the labor leaders, and of Senator George Sutherland, Republican, in Utah, where the women voters taok the situation into their own hands. The election of William M. Calder, Republican in New York, served to show his lican, in New York, served to show his great popularity in that State, as he led the national and State tickets by thousands of votes in snowing under William F. PLAN TO TAKE FIGHT BEFORE CONGRESS

With Half the Union Dry, Battle Will Be Opened for National Amendment, Leader Says

WANT STATE IN LINE

The next scene of the struggle of the dry rees to drive Uncle Sam out of the liquor fording to a statement issued today by the lev. Homer W. Tope, head of the Pennylvania branch of the Anti-Saloon League f America.

Mr. Tope pointed out that the winning of five new states by the drys in last Tues-day's election, making a total of twenty-four States now in the liquorless column, would make national prohibition a issue at the next session of Congress, which convenes in December. Pennsylvania Con-gressmen, he declared, would be confronted with the prohibition issue and would have no opportunity to evade the question.

"The Hobson national prohibition amend ment will be submitted at the next seesion," he said. "We shall have to obtain a two-thirds majority of the Senate and a two-thirds majority of the House in order to have this amendment submitted to the States for ratification. To sweep booze from the United States we must have ratifrom the United States we had have from the United States by thirty-six States. Four additional States, Montana, Nebraska, South Dakots and Michigan, went dry last Tuesday, and a temperance Governor and Legislature were elected in Utah, which assures us of prohibition in that State when the legislature convenes. That gives us twenty-four dry States—half the States in the Union. We are also virtually certain that Alaska went dry, and we have strong hopes that Florida will shortly be awarg into the dry column, for we understand that the independent candiwe understand that the independent canudate for Governor, a strong temperance advocate, has won out in that State.

Therefore, it will be seen that we only need nine more States to stop the manufacture and sale of liquor in the United States.

"Our hardest problem will be to get the two-thirds vote in Congress. While last Tuesday's election was a tremendous ad-vance in the bause of boozeless America, it should be impressed upon the dry forces that there is plenty of hard fighting yet in front of us. Four-fifths of the liquor traf-fic is now cornered in a half dozen of the great cities of the country, but the heads of the traffic are desperate and they are now going to fight tooth and nail to defeat the will of the people. The campaign of the Anti-Saloon League of America will swing onward, waging a hard, practical warfare against the last crumbling trenches of the

"The splendid victory for the drys in Tuesday's election will have its reflex ac tion on Pennsylvania. The people of this State are waking up to the curse of the liquor business, and the time is not far dis tant when Pennsylvania will fail in line with more progressive States. Pennsylva-nia Congressmen will no longer be able to ignore the question of national prohibition

"As our national superintendent, the Rev P. A. Baker, has stated, the time has come to insert a plank in the platform of all political parties favoring nation-wide prohibition. The last President has been elected who will enter the White House dumb and silent upon this, the greatest and most far-reaching question now before the American people. But one thing can pre-vent it from being an acute issue in the next presidential campaign, and that is for Congress to submit the question for ratifica-tion by the States before the next presi-dential campaign."

HUGHES ISN'T WORRIED OVER CHANCES TO WIN

Hughes is still entirely confident that the ultimate result will be his election. He planned another quiet day with an automobile ride and no politics, except possibly with Chairman Willcox.
