MUSICAL MADNESS IN MOVIES PASSING

But Still They Will Play Chopin on the Organ-Notable Exceptions

When Frank E. Woods, now manager of production for the Pine Aria studio and faithful Achates to D. W. Griffith, was running the moving picture department on a New York weekly, he used to dig up ouriosities, abuses and errors of the movies Those were the days when nothing ran longer than one reel, comedies being restricted to 500 feet. Naturally the artistic standards were not high and Mr. Woods had plenty of opportunity to suggest im provements.

One of the glaring faults that he found was the total lack of fitness shown in selecting the music. Of course a piano was the only instrument heard in a picture play house. Organs and orchestras were out of the question in an era that was just emerging from the nickelodeon stage. But even the planea, so he complained, were wretchedly handled and the planists gifted with no some of appositeness. His long strained patience collapsed utterly when he heard "the professor" one day accompany the film of a funeral with 'There'll be a Hot Time in the Old Town Tonight." Of was it "In the Good Old Summer Time? At any rate the point is clear.

Today we have instead of the wretche little "store" theaters handsome buildings and sonorous organs and sometimes well-trained orchestras replacing the tinny planos of '08 and '09. But with all the intelligence that managers bestow on their musical programs there yet remains something to be done in suiting the melody to the action. Only the other day the photoplay editor heard selections from a musical comedy played so badly that they resembled the corpse of the score. The classic example of a bugle call "rendered" on a piccolo was recorded mentally a year or so ago. And while it may be lots of fun for the man who is playing a waltz or a mazurka. Chopin has no place on the organ. There are lots of other composers who will "register" through this mode of expression. Not Chopin. intelligence that managers bestow on their
